Building Lumber Assured Forever, Expert States

Increased growth of timber under the intensive tree farm program of private industry will insure adequate quantities of lumber forever for the nation's home building and construction needs, reports W. D. Hagenstein of the Industrial Forestry Association.

"The nationally recognized forest-management program, now only 14 years old, has spread to 37 states, includes 24,508,771 acres of private timberland.

Assurance of a continuous supply of lumber from managed forests, he said, is good news to the nation's 27,000 retail lumbermen, for lumber makes up from 30 to 60 per cent of the sales volume of these businesses. It is good news as well to the more than 800,000 to 1,000,000 trained carpenters, cabinet makers and other skilled wood craftsmen who use wood exclusively in construction.

Bruce Richards Receives Highest Scholarship Award At Cranbrook

Seventeen-year-old Bruce Richards of Farmington has been named recipient of one of Cranbrook School's top awards, the Clay Doss Memorial Scholarship, it was disclosed by school officials this week.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. Howard L. Richards of 31731 Sherwood, Bruce earned the scholarship on the basis of his high academic work and position as a school leader.

His father is a Farmington attorney.

Funds for the award have been made available through Mr. and Mrs. H. C. Doss of Detroit in memory of their son, who graduated from Cranbrook in 1948 and was killed shortly thereafter.

Young Richards entered Cranbrook in 1952 as a freshman. Now a senior, he has found time to maintain good grades and participate in extra-curricular activities as well.

Following his interest in music, Bruce has become an ardent trumpet player and last spring was elected president of the school band. He is also a member of the Cranbrook orchestra, where he leads the trumpet section.

On the athletic fields his interests center around soccer in the fall and baseball during spring term.

Among his other activities are the school newspaper, the radio club, and the dramatics organization. Last year he won special recognition for doing outstanding work in the field of arts and crafts.

Prior to entering Cranbrook, Bruce attended school in Farmington. He plans to go on to college at either Colby or Denison after his graduation next June from Cranbrook.

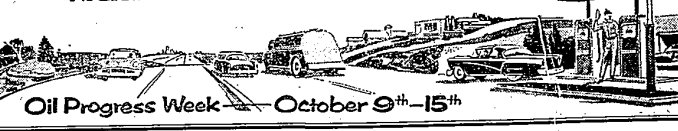
