## LOCKER PLANTS STORING VENISON TO BE INSECTED

Within coming weeks successful hunters will be bringing deer carcasses to be processed for consumption later to locker plants over which representatives of the Michigan Department of Agriculture's bureau of foods and standards enforce locker plant laws.

Locker plants, according to Department Director G. S. McIntyre, must be licensed by the department and maintain strict sanitation of equipment, utensils and refrigerators, and must keep proper temperatures.

Deer hunters are advised to dress out carcasses immediately after killing, and protect them from possible contamination until delivery is made to the locker plant.

The locker plant operator must inspect every carcass of meat to see that it is not contaminated or decomposed. State regulations prohibit storage of deer with the hides or skin on in the same room with other meat products, it was explained by Miles A. Nelson, bureau chief, who said that inspectors will give special attention to locker plants during hunting season.


