**CONSERVATION WORKERS BUILD NEW FISH SORTER**

The Conservation Department is developing a time and labor saving mechanical fish sorter for use in Michigan's fish hatcheries. The proposed device works like a sieve or potato grader to sort fish by size classes. M. J. DeBoer in charge of hatchery operations, says the chore often takes a full crew two weeks a year at each hatchery. He guesses the new sorter may cut this to two days.

Fish workers will be able to take the grader right into a hatchery pond for quick separation.

Separation keeps big trout from eating their little brothers, assures all fish an even break for food and makes possible spring and summer plantings of uniform size classes.

The first working model, built in the machine shops at Hosocomm forest fire experiment station, was tried at Grayling hatchery last week and a number of flaws were uncovered.

The Department would like to build corrected models this winter for use at hatcheries next year.

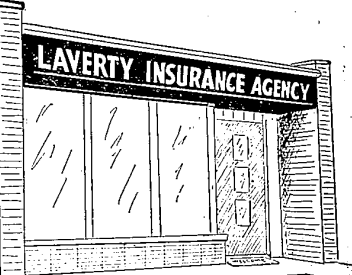

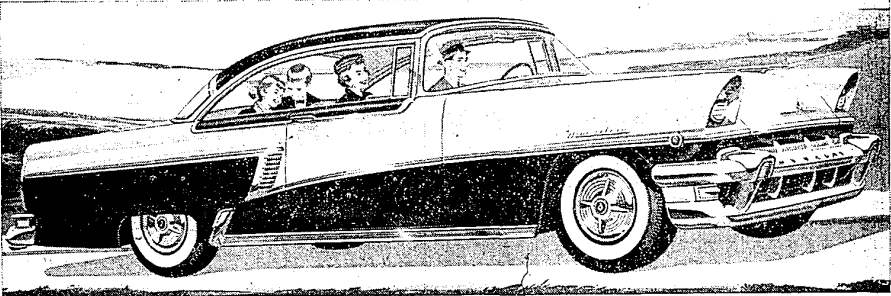
