Bobcat Hunting, Trapping Restricted For First Time

This month, for the first time in Michigan's history, bobcats will receive protection from hunters and trappers.

The recent Michigan legislature closed the lower peninsula to bobcat hunting and trapping except for a December 15 to March 15 hunting period. The law became effective October 15.

Trapping, except by permit, is prohibited in the lower peninsula after that date.

Before the law, hunters and trappers were free to take bobcats at any time.

Cats are still hunted as predators in the upper peninsula.
