STATE RECEIVES GAME, FISH PROGRAM FUNDS FROM U. S.

Michigan will receive a maximum of \$380,525 under the Pittman - Robertson game program and a third-place \$240,624.82 under the Dingell-Johnson fish program during the next eight months.

The U. S. Department of the Interior announced distribution early this week of \$12,400,000 under the P-R program and \$5,350,000 under the D-J program.

Hunters and fishermen pay federal taxes when they buy guns, fishing tackle, field clothing and other equipment. The money is held in a fund earmarked for game and fish restoration purposes.

The fund is rationed out to the states each year according to the size of the state and its number of hunters and fishermen. Michigan and Texas tied for first under the P-R program and Michigan was third behind California and Minnesota in D-J apportionment.

Michigan has always placed high on the list nationally and uses its money for game land acquisition, research, purchase of fishing sites and other conservation needs.

DeVere Fleming, representing the Farmington Development Company, asked for immediate zoning of a triangular piece of land south of the Cut-Off and east of Farmington Road containing about 21 acres.

Motion made by Cavanaugh and supported by Calkins that the zoning of the triangular piece of land, above described, be taken to the combined meeting of the Council and the Planning Commission to be held October 19, 1955. Motion carried, all years.

Mr. Stanley Genei appeared at the Council meeting, requesting closing of Valley View from Lot 58 to Cornwall property. It was suggested that a Petition be prepared and be presented to Council and Planning Commission at their joint meeting.

Motion made by Calkins and supported by Cavanaugh that the following Resolution be enacted:

RESOLVED: that the City of Farmington change the name of Valley View Subdivision to Scenic View Subdivision. Motion carries, all years.

Bids for awarding contracts for construction of 2 pump houses, 1 rest room and 1 transformer house were read as follows:

Motion made by Calkins and supported by Bates that contract for Construction be awarded to Albert Gain, Builder. Motion carried, all years.

Motion made by Cavanaugh and supported by Chapman that Howard Warner be appointed to fill a vacancy on the Planning Commission and that a letter be written to him advising him of the appointment. Motion carried, all years.

Cavanaugh requested that the Council send a strong letter to the Board of Appeals instructing them to keep a record of all their proceedings and to bring their minutes up to date, and also advising that their minutes are to be read at the Council meetings.

Motion made by Cavanaugh and supported by Chapman that the sidewalk on the east side of Power and north of Shawnessy at Springbrook Gardens be in a straight line and that the property owner comply with the removal of the building from the right of way, and that the installation of sidewalk be made by May 1, 1956. Motion carried, all years.

Motion made by Cavanaugh and supported by Calkins that all property owners on the north side of Grand River and Hawthorne to Warner Street be requested to put in sidewalks at their own expense, or to replace existing ones at the proper grade level, or have the City install them and bill the property owner. Motion carried, all years.

It was suggested that 15 m.p.h. speed limit signs and "Stop for Pedestrians" signs be used in the School Areas. It was also suggested that the signs be portable. This plan is to be worked out with the City Manager, Chief of Police, and the Superintendent of Schools.

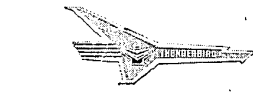
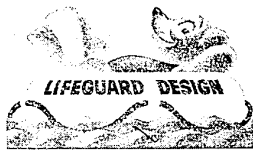
