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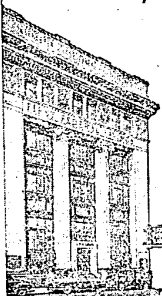
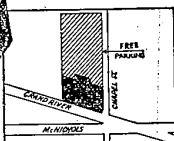

COUNTY RED CROSS PLANS DISCUSSION OF BLOOD PROGRAM

Problems involved in the overall administration of the blood program in Oakland County will be discussed when members of the blood advisory committee in the five-chapter area meet October 27 at the Oakland County Red Cross Chapter House.

Mrs. John Blanchard, committee chairman, will lead the discussion on the scheduling of mobiles to provide an even, steady supply of blood. New techniques of donor recruitment will be explained.

Mrs. Blanchard points out that although there is a full schedule of mobiles for the coming months, donor recruitment has fallen down. She says that 175 pints of blood must be collected per day in the area including Wayne, Oakland, St. Clair and Washtenaw Counties. Sufficient volunteers to operate these mobiles is necessary to meet the demands of the hospitals, says Mrs. Blanchard.

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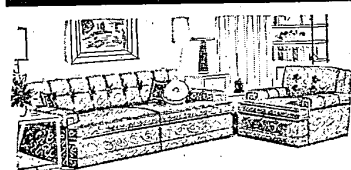
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
