Farmington Wins First League Tilt; Downs Vikings

The Farmington Falcons chalked up their first league win of the season by defeating the Walled Lake Vikings, 7-0, last Friday night.

Farmington scored their lone touchdown in the third period.

The first period was marked by fourth down punts and neither squad could make further than midfield.

In successive first downs early in the second quarter, Walker and Woodworth led the Vikings to their own 47, but the Walled Lake team was stopped and forced to punt.

In the second half, Walled Lake picked up a first down on three plays to their own 47. However, a 15-yard penalty put the ball back on the Walled Lake 32.

Woodworth again came through with an 11-yard jaunt to the Viking 43-yard stripe. Segnitz romped to the Falcon 40, but an other penalty against Walled Lake placed the piskin on their own 45.

The teams battled defensively until the closing minutes of the third quarter. Kosty of Farmington gathered in a Viking fourth-down kick on his own 21 yard line, and with the help of key blockers, Kosty put the ball on the 15. Kosty then scampered around left end to the one and Robinson, on the next play, plunged into the end zone for the first score.

The Vikings tried desperately to score during the fourth quarter by resorting to an aerial attack, but penalties stopped them from making any serious threats.

In the closing minutes the Vikings were knocking on the Falcons' door. A pass to Woodworth netted Walled Lake a first down on Farmington's 41. Woodworth caught another pass on the Falcon 16 two plays later. Walled Lake, however, went no further than the eight as the final gun sounded.

Friday the Falcons will take on the Berkley Bears on the Farmington gridiron, while the Vikings will play host to league-leader Van Dyke.
