

### Four Injured In Two-Car Crash

Four Farmington residents suffered injuries in a two-car collision on Shawnee Road west of Lakeway Monday morning, shortly after 8 o'clock.

The crash occurred when a vehicle driven by Joseph Eorhette, 18, of 21584 Ontario, making a left turn, pulled into the path of an oncoming car from the opposite direction driven by Mathilde Sevel, 34, of 32391 Loomis Street.

Injured were Mrs. Sevel, lacerations about the chin, Pat Sevel, 14, bumped head, skinned knee; Dan Soderquist, 15, 23340 Orchard Lake Road, bumped forehead; and Flo Hardesty, 15, 20791 Greening, lacerations to the head and lip. All injuries were of a minor nature and were treated by a local physician.

ceive and disburse funds in behalf of the proposed project. This question was raised several weeks ago and an opinion was secured from the corporations counsel.

ACTION is now under way in the drafting of proposed resolutions to create the necessary authority. Before the organization can be established resolutions must be approved by each of the participating governmental units as well as the Oakland County Board of Supervisors. As soon as the resolutions have been completed they will be submitted to the various agencies and the authority can be set up before the plans have been approved by the State.

Arrangements are now being made for a meeting between the committee and land developers in an effort to determine the degree of financial participation which can be expected from the various subdivisions. A number have already committed themselves on the advancement of money to hasten the completion of the proposed project.

(The following is a copy of a letter sent to the Transportation Committee of the Farmington Board of Education and passed on to The Enterprise regarding the transportation and safety of children attending the new school on Shawnee at Tucker Road - Editor.)

We are writing you regarding the temporary transporting of our children in the Shawnee area to school by bus. This should include children from the first grade through the sixth grade. Speaking for the parents of this area, we feel that the use of buses should be constant until such time as proper safety conditions for walking are provided.

We understand that in other areas of the Farmington Township School District, there are children living within the mile who are being bused to school. This committee, chosen to represent the Shawnee school area, is very surprised and disappointed because we feel that the children in our area should have the same consideration as the children of other areas.

It has been brought to our attention that the Township Board has not replied to the request from the Board of Education for a meeting regarding the establishment of safety precautions and the use of buses in transporting children to and from school. Again we ask that such a meeting be brought about. We need and must have the following:

1. Sidewalks or an easement on Shawnee Road from Tulane to the school and from Hawthorne to the school.
2. Safety signs along the way and auxiliary police protection at Nine Mile Road and Shawnee during traveling time for the children.
3. Cut either Purdue, Colgate or Albion through.
4. Proper scraping and salting of roads in winter.

The parents in this section have been very patient, but now our patience is exhausted. This committee feels that if you do not deal with a few, you may have to deal with many.

We look forward to the solution of this problem.

Roads for a new school site. The lands, between 19 and 20 acres, is proposed as a possible site for a new Junior High School building.

The Board authorized the purchase of a station wagon to be used for the transportation of orthopedic cases to and from the special education annex at the Eagle School.

It was revealed that water had been found at approximately 84 feet in the new well at the Middlebelt school. Both the old and new well at the school site will be used to insure an adequate supply of water at all times. Installation of a new pump was authorized.

A report on the progress in the grading of the new athletic field at the high school indicated that the job is approximately sixty per cent completed. Bids are now being obtained for construction of a baseball diamond and football field and for the extension and improvement of present parking facilities.

Concern was expressed by the Board over the delay in final completion of work at the three new elementary schools. Steps were authorized to speed completion.

the pump houses.

James Tennant, City Manager, stated that the new system should be in operation by the first week in November. It is expected that all present water restrictions will be lifted as soon as the newly enlarged system is in use. Tennant added that the installation of the one pump will provide an increase of 55% over the present pumping capacity and that the usage of a second pump will increase the capacity by 106%. The second pump is to be installed after the system has been placed in operation.

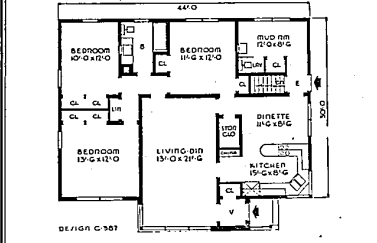
City officials reported this week that a study is now being made to determine whether additional pumping capacity should be provided or whether water storage facilities should be constructed.
