Every Thursday from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. the storage room and a work room at Knox House will be open for processing clothing in preparation for its sale. Work will consist of sorting, sizing, pressing, mending, pricing and receiving.

Persons who wish to donate clothing or small household articles may deliver them to Knox House, 26165 Farmington Road, every Thursday during the above-mentioned hours. A pickup service will be arranged by calling GR. 4-1414 or GR. 4-1264.

Farmington Resale Shop invites ladies who can spare a few hours a week or more to devote their labor to process clothing in preparation for sale.

The Farmington Resale Shop is a non-profit organization, supported by 14 local church and service groups, whose purpose is to make good used clothing available to all Farmington area residents. An attractive feature of the Shop's service is the sale of extra good clothing on consignment.

### HUNTERS URGED TO RETURN BANDS FROM WILD GAME

Hunters are urged to send metal bands found on deer, bear, woodcock, grouse, waterfowl and other game to conservation agencies.

Waterfowl bands should be returned to the Fish and Wildlife Service in Washington. Most other bands can be mailed to the Conservation Department in Lansing.

These agencies need to know where and when the game was killed, and the name and address of the hunter.

In the case of waterfowl, the Fish and Wildlife Service sends a report to the hunter, telling where and when the bird was banded.

Hunters pay taxes so state and federal employees can carry on tagging and banding programs. All this money is lost unless the hunter follows through on the program.

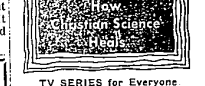
### Bond School Child Study Group To Meet Nov. 8

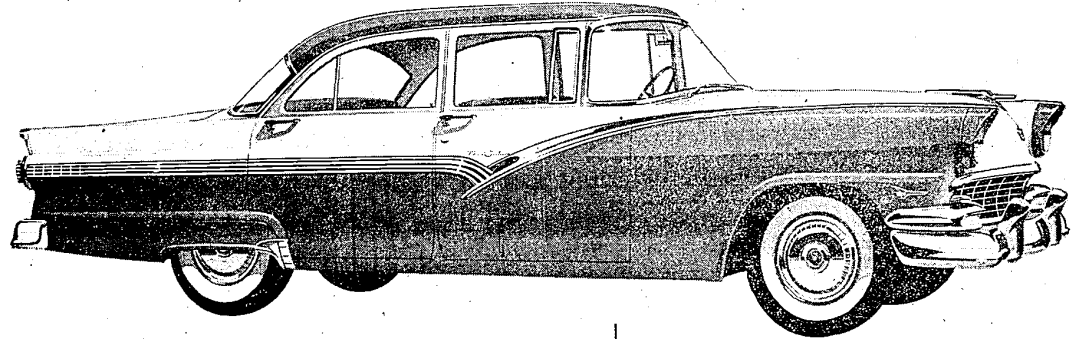
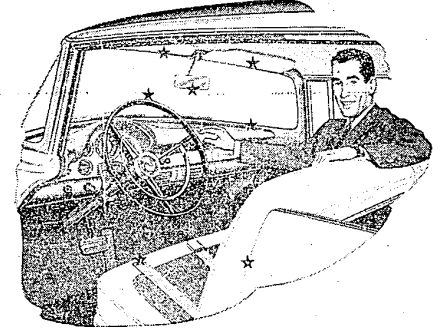

### College Night To Be Held At West Bloomfield

The Fourth Annual Inter-Lakes College Night program will be held November 8 at the West Bloomfield High School.

Parents of juniors and seniors at Farmington High School are invited to accompany their sons and daughters. The purpose of College Night is to examine all sources of information on college life.

Representatives of 23 colleges in the state will be at the meeting to answer questions of students and parents.

The first phase of the program runs from 4:30 to 5:30 p.m., during which time students and parents may converse informally with the representatives.

Another informal conversation period is scheduled from 7:00 to 7:30 p.m.

At 7:30 the first formal session will begin, during which reports by representatives of the various colleges and universities will be made. A question and answer period will follow.

A third informal session will be held from 8:45 to 9:15 p.m.

Colleges which will be represented at the College Night program are: Adrian, Albion, Alma, Business Institute of Detroit, Central, Cleary, Stephens, University of Detroit, University of Michigan, Wayne University, Western College of Education, Nursing Schools, Ferris, General Motors Institute, Highland Park Junior College, Hillsdale, Kalamazoo, Lawrence Tech, Michigan College of Mining and Technology, Michigan State University, Michigan State Normal and Olivet. A Selective Service representative will also be present.
