the property. The majority of the land is located in the City.

A motion was made and approved authorizing the extension of city water to the home of Mr. and Mrs. H. A. McClish of Fink street. According to the City Manager, McClish requested the service about two years ago, prior to the ban on water extensions outside the city. It was also pointed out that this is the only home on Fink street which is not being served with city water.

Wilbur Brotherton, 23622 Beacon Drive, asked the Council what could be done about the debris which exists in the Bel-Aire Hills subdivision. He stated that during the recent rain storm many streets were flooded because of clogged gutters. Tennant stated that the developers have gone through this area once and that the City has attempted to clean up the streets. The manager added that much of the debris is in the ground and is being turned up by property owners in landscaping. It was suggested that the developers be contacted again regarding the matter and that residents place any debris they find in containers so that it can be picked up by the City.

delegate was also appointed to contact the Automobile Association of America to see if they would not send a safety counselor out to discuss local problems.


The state laws regulating school bus transportation and reimbursement for the same were discussed at another meeting of the special committee held Wednesday November 9.
