Commercial of a parcel of land at the northwest corner of Twelve Mile Road and Drake Road. Harry McCracken, owner of the property, stated that the rezoning was requested to allow for the expansion of a fruit storage building on the property. McCracken stated that all of the main interests will eventually become commercial as the Township develops. Following the discussion, a show of hands disclosed that 29 persons in attendance at the hearing were opposed to the change.

The second proposal concerned the rezoning from Residential to Commercial of a strip of land on the west side of Orchard Lake Road between Thirteenth and Fourteenth Mile Roads. The owner of the property stated that the proposed commercial strip was designed as a buffer for a larger residential area which is being planned on the balance of the property. A number of property owners in the vicinity of the area voiced objections to the proposal on the grounds that it would injure their property.

The third proposed change involved a parcel of land on the northeast corner of Farmington Road and Eight Mile Road which would be rezoned from Residential to Light Industrial. However, the owners of the property stated that they intended to develop the property as commercial. It was pointed out by the Board that this property is already zoned Light Industrial to a depth of approximately 600 feet. The owners proposed in their petition that the school buildings in the District 1200 feet. They stated that an effort would be made to develop the property in accordance with present zoning provisions.

from the school architect's office revealed that nearly all the jobs yet to be completed on the three new elementary schools and the high school addition should be finished by next week. It was reported that the Township Board Trustee, that steps also be taken to complete the leveling of playgrounds around the new schools and have playground equipment erected immediately. Superintendent Dunckel assured the Board that this would be done as soon as possible.

The naming of all elementary schools in the School District was discussed by the Board. It was felt that both parents and youngsters in the area of the school should have a part in the naming of these schools. Requests will now be made for names which parents and youngsters feel appropriate for the various elementary schools.

A name for the School District has now been officially adopted. It will be known henceforth as the Farmington District. Ownership of the German and Nichols School, highly questionable legally for some time, has now been determined. It was disclosed at the Board meeting that title guarantees have now been obtained on the two sites, giving the School District clear legal ownership to both the Nichols School is presently being used as a storage building while the German School is housing a kindergarten class.

Preliminary plans are now being made to place a new bond issue before a vote of the people in order to raise money for the construction of more needed school buildings in the District. The School Board authorized Superintendent Dunckel to proceed in working out details for having such a bond issue placed to a vote at the earliest possible date.

McKelvey stated that "in this season of Thanksgiving let's help those who are not as fortunate as ourselves to regain health and opportunity through the progress that is being made against this dreaded disease." The chairman added that 75% of the funds collected this year will be set aside for research into this disease which has afflicted over 200,000 persons, two-thirds of whom are children. The other portion of the funds will go to the Muscular Dystrophy Clinic in Detroit Memorial Hospital to intensify its care of patients.

Favor Expanding School Bus Service

At a special transportation committee meeting held Wednesday evening, November 9, at Middlebelt School, further discussion was conducted on possible steps which might be taken to expand school bus services within the Farmington Public School System. Representatives from five of the elementary schools in the district were present at the meeting. A report disclosed that the School Board was following completely the transportation policy for School Districts as set up by the State. It was the feeling of all, however, that due to conditions of roads and other unusual conditions in the Farmington area, extra services should be provided. The committee went on record as favoring almost total bus service for all youngsters, even if it would mean an increase in taxes.

Some uncertainty was expressed as to whether the project for more bus service should or could be sought by P. T. A. groups or whether it would be necessary to handle such a project through a separate special organization. This matter should be studied more fully at individual school P. T. A. meetings, it was decided.

A suggestion was also made that an outside attorney be hired to study all phases of school transportation and report to the group on his findings. This was universally agreed that this would be desirable but only if a large enough group would be willing to stand the cost for hiring an attorney for this purpose.

Representatives agreed to discuss proposals made at the meeting with other interested parties and encourage them to promote efforts for obtaining better school bus services in the District. A date for another meeting of the group will be set later.

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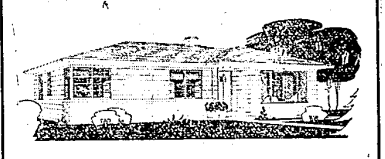

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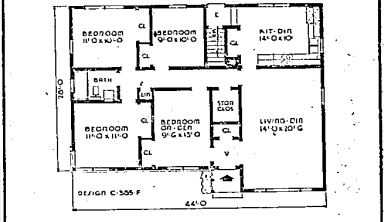
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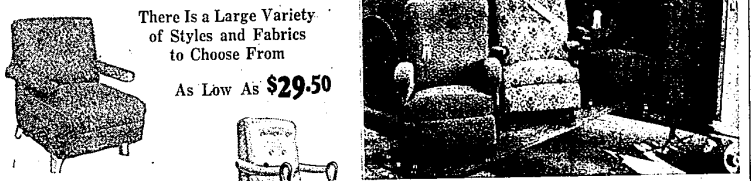


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
