Rocca - Carleton To Wrestle Dec. 9 At Olympia

Antonio Rocca, who thrilled his admirers with his great stand against world champion Lou Tress in Detroit recently, will return to the Olympia on Friday, December 9, to wrestle the dangerous Lord Carleton.

Rocca has two big incentives for victory against the powerful Carleton. He wants to even accounts for an old score with Lord Carleton and he wants to give new impetus for another shot at Tress.

In his first clash with Lord Carleton three years ago, Rocca gave a tremendous exhibition of skill and stamina against one of the greatest and most unscrupulous men in the trade. Although he refused to try to heat Lord Carleton at the latter's own villainous game, he was clearly winning against his bigger opponent.

Lord Carleton, however, outraged the fans so much by his foul tactics that the match ended in a near riot. The police had to escort Lord Carleton through the threatening throng. Only prompt action by officials averted possible bloodshed.

Lord Carleton was disqualified, but Rocca wasn't satisfied with that outcome. He wanted the chance to prove his superiority over Lord Carleton in the ring. It is typical of Rocca that he has refused to give up since to get rematch with his Lordship in Detroit.

This is a crucial match for Rocca. He knows that he must win this one in impressive style to force Tress to put his title on the line against him. And Rocca has good reason to fear that Tress will be in a hurry to sell his Brown. Tress had enough of Rocca in their feud in October. The bout, a furious, savage scrap from start to finish, ended in a double knockout. Up until the sudden and dramatic ending, however, Rocca had been in command almost all the way. Tress had to risk a heavy right hand, and he knows plenty, to avoid being pinned. Rocca had him in serious trouble on several occasions.

Rocca has announced that he will post a check for \$5,000 with the Michigan Board of Athletic Control to guarantee his appearance for a title bout against Tress any time the match can be made. It is sure that he can win the world championship if he can get Tress into the ring with him again. His first Rocca must conquer the troublesome Lord Carleton. And that will take some doing.

Conservation Department workers said this week that Michigan's recently-ended archery deer season was a success, as good or better than last year. Spot checks support their statement.

At Swan Creek wildlife station, where archers must report kills, 11 whitetails were taken through November 5 where seven were bagged last year. The Allean season continues into December, but the general Michigan season closed November 5.

At Rose Lake station near Lansing, archers bagged two deer this year, first in the history of the station. On Drummond Island, archers took 37 deer last year. This year, they passed that total nine days before the end of the season. Also, an estimated 33,000 archers were last year the total was 30,000. Good weather helped, too. The woods were wet enough to be quiet and cool enough to be pleasant.

STATE BEGINS LONG RANGE EXPERIMENT ON TROUT STOCKS Michigan has started a long-range experiment to boost trout growth, coloration and egg production into its hatchery trout stocks.

The selective breeding will also attempt to produce a stronger, disease-resistant trout for Michigan fishermen. The work is under way at Harrietta, Grayling, Wolf Lake and Thompson hatcheries. A selected number of fish are being used at the start. This will dovetail with Conservation Department workers selecting the better fish as work progresses.

Broods, browns, and rainbows are involved in the genetic study. One special target is a fungus disease, furunculosis. Destructive and hard to control, the disease is common in hatchery browns and occasionally appears in rainbows. Eggs are usually taken from trout in their third year so each selecting process will require that length of time. State workers are not sure how many fish generations will be needed to produce the desired strain, but hope progress will be evident in the next few years.

Hunters Asked To Report Information On Bears

Bear facts are needed to help wildlife and the sport of hunting. This year, Conservation Department field workers live-trapped, tagged and released 33 black bears in the upper peninsula. Game workers don't know how far these animals travel or where hunters may find them during deer season. Such basic information would help set future seasons and bag limits. Sportsmen who hunt in the central upper peninsula are being asked to be on the lookout for tagged bear and to report them if taken this fall. Reports should be mailed to Casino wildlife station at Shingleton or to Department headquarters at Lansing.
