(Continued from Page 1A) with the County Road Commission on the installation of a regulated traffic light at the corner of Orchard Lake Road and Ten Mile Road. The County had requested in a letter that the City pay one-fourth the cost of the station and maintenance of the traffic signal. The City's portion of the installation will be \$225 with \$40 to \$50 per month for maintenance. It is expected that the light will be installed in about six weeks.

Philip Langward appeared before the Council with a detailed plan for the development of the old Our Lady of Sorrows School property, Grand River at Mooney, as a shopping center. He requested that the property be rezoned as commercial to a depth of approximately 650 feet north of Grand River. He stated that all outlets and inlets would be off from Mooney. The Council requested that Langward present the matter to the Planning Commission for study and recommendation.

James Rainey, resident of Warren Farm, Subdivision, appeared before the Council in regard to the proposed rezoning of the west side of South Farmington Road from residential to commercial. He stated what action the Council intended to take regarding the proposal. Councilman James Cavanaugh stated that the proposed rezoning ordinance was now under study and that the residents will be advised when final hearings are held on the ordinance and map. Rainey stated that residents in the vicinity of the proposed commercial area are strongly opposed to any change in the present zoning.

The Council unanimously approved motion to the effect that nothing be done to improve Fink Street at this time. Fink, which is only a half street, is located on the northern boundary of the city, running east of Orchard Lake Road. A number of requests have been made for the improvement of the street.

(Continued from Page 1A) volunteers have been secured. Officials explained that the questionnaire contains eight inquiries, all of which are of vital importance to the realization of the water system. The principal questions involve the financing of the project, such as "Are you willing to have your lot assessed a minimum of \$2.00 or a maximum of \$3.00 per front foot payable over a period of 20 years?" "Are you willing to pay between \$4.00 and \$6.00 per month water service rate for a period of time until the debt is paid?" A third question is: "Would you be willing to pay into the Township Treasury within three to four months up to \$50.00 per home as a good faith advance on your special assessment, which money will prove that you are willing to accept the proposed water system?"

It is proposed that petitions be circulated at the same time as the questionnaire requesting the Township Board to set up a special assessment district for the purpose of financing the system. As soon as 65% of the property owners in each subdivision have signed a petition, and assessment district can be established.
