State Department Of Agriculture Warns Of Christmas Tree Law

Estimated to be a \$5 million business in the state, sale and movement of Christmas trees and evergreen boughs will be closely watched by representatives of the Michigan Department of Agriculture, whose bureau of plant industry is responsible for enforcement of the state's Christmas tree law.

Cutting of trees for the yule trade is already in progress, and inspectors have been assigned to prevent regions. As the sales season develops, other inspectors will check sales lots and places where Christmas trees are offered for sale.

The Christmas tree law requires that anyone cutting, moving or transporting evergreen trees or boughs must have in possession a bill of sale from the owner of the land where trees were cut. This bill of sale must be made on a form provided free by the Michigan Department of Agriculture.

They are available at State Police posts, sheriff's offices, Conservation Department district offices or County Agricultural extension offices.

An exception occurs when a person buys trees or boughs from someone who is not the original land owner. In such cases the person transporting the trees or boughs must have in possession a simple bill of sale showing name and address of the person from whom they were bought and the number and kind.

Strange Deer Disease Strikes In Two Counties

Dead deer, victims of the same strange disease that killed some 150 whitetails this fall, were found recently in Ogemaw and Oscoda Counties.

The deer, one in each county, were the first known victims of the disease in Ogemaw and Oscoda.

Conservation Department game specialists believe the deer killer, which struck heavily in five western Michigan counties last September, is a virus disease. Some deaths were also reported as far east as Midland and Saginaw Counties.

Two more victims of the disease also were found by game workers in Manistee County recently.
