The report, concerning the procedures and objectives on the development of a master plan for the Township, is not only one of the most complete we have ever seen but is exceedingly practical in its approach and application.

The Enterprise has for many years advocated the development of a master plan for the Township. We believe that it is an essential tool for the systematic and orderly development of any growing community. However, the program proposed and recommended by the Planning Board is far more complete than the majority of similar plans, This, we believe, constitutes a major advantage, since the Township is growing with almost unprecidented speed.

The question has been raised many times as to why communities need a master plan. The best answer we know comes in the form of another obvious question. Why do you need a plan to build a house? Building communities and building houses are very similar. If we are to have a pleasant atmosphere, usability of space, proper organization of lay-out, room for expansion and last but not least economy, a plan is essential. Without going into the details of each phase, it is obvious that a great deal of time and skill is necessary to develop such a plan. The only legical way to do it is to get experts in the field of planning board has recommended that a consultant firm be employed to assist with the plan.



Looking Back Through The Enterprise Files

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS AGO (December 4, 1930)

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Mik Ordinance was approved by the City Commission Monday evening which prevents the sale of unsafe milk. All milk offered for sale in the City of Farmington must be either pasteurized or certified. The ordinance also provides that all bottles must be stemicleaned, that bottling and capping must be done by machinery, and that restaurants must serve milk in original containers. Still other provisions call for automatic coolers and thermometers in posteurizing plants, the appointment of a milk inspector, and an annual license for dairy operators. Need for the ordinance was deemed necessary to prevent an outbreak of typhoid fever such as occurred in Northville and Plymouth recently. Two persons died there as a result of the sickness.
