NEW ARMY TRAINING PROGRAM OFFERED 17 TO 18½ YEAR OLDS

Here is something of interest to young men between the ages of 17 and 18 and their parents: Under the recently-passed Reserve Forces Act, young men in that age group may discharge their military service obligation and remain at home, except for a six-month period of training after finishing high school. This opportunity can be theirs by enlisting in an Army Reserve unit near their home. Training consists of weekly assemblies and two weeks annual summer training, for all of which they will receive pay. Since quotas for this service will be limited, it would be wise for the young men in this age group to see their local Army Reserve Advisor as soon as possible. The nearest advisor is located at 37 West Lawrence Street in Pontiac. His telephone number is Federal 5-0111.
