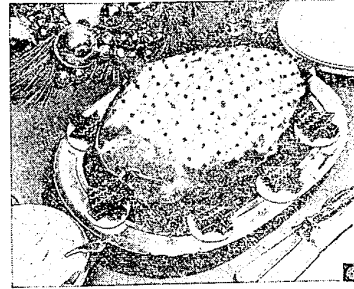

Christmas is the time to take advantage of ham for easy entertaining. Even the most amateur cook can produce a masterpiece with these simple directions.

Place ham fat side up on rack in open roasting pan. Do not add water. Do not cover. Do not baste. Bake in slow oven (325°F.) (If you have a meat thermometer, insert it through outside into center of thickest part of ham so that bulb does not rest on bone or fat.)

HAM, whole Uncooked, 10-12 lbs.	160°F.	18-20
Ready-to-eat, 10-12 lbs.	130°F.	10
HAM, half Uncooked, 6-8 lbs.	160°F.	22-25
Ready-to-eat, 6-8 lbs.	130°F.	10
Picnic (shoulder)	170°F.	30-35
Boneless Butt (College roll)	170°F.	40-45

Times given are for ham at room temperatures when started. Since heat penetrates a thick piece of meat like ham very slowly, additional time should be allowed when meat has been taken from refrigerator a short time before roasting. Many hams on the market carry cooking directions which should be used for that particular kind. Half an hour before ham is done (meat thermometer will register (150°F.) remove ham from oven and peel off rind with a sharp knife. Score the surface of the fat end, if desired, insert a whole clove in the center of each scored section, glaze it to your taste with brown sugar, molasses, or marmalade.

CIVIL DEFENSE TRAFFIC WORKSHOP NOW IN PROGRESS IN DETROIT

An emergency traffic control workshop, conducted by the Michigan Office of Civil Defense in cooperation with representatives of the City of Detroit, Wayne, Oakland and Macomb Counties and the Federal Civil Defense Administration, is being held in Detroit this week.

Specific subjects on the agenda include traffic planning, communications, traffic supervision, transportation regulations, personnel requirements and facilities.

The results of the workshop take on additional importance because of the selection of the Detroit metropolitan area by the Federal Civil Defense Administration as one of the areas in the United States in which the Survival Plan Project will be conducted.

Following the conclusion of the workshop, the results will be put to immediate test to recruit and train auxiliaries to the police and engineering services and provide necessary equipment and supplies.

Serving as instructors are C. F. van Blankensteyn, director of the Michigan Office of Civil Defense; J. Russell Prior, director of Safety Officer, Federal Civil Defense Administration; Thomas Stack, police specialist of the Federal Civil Defense Administration in Region 4; Rescoe Helton, highway traffic analyst of the state highway department; Donald E. Oates, sergeant with the Safety and Traffic Bureau of the Michigan State Police; and Robert W. Smith of the motor transportation division of the Michigan Public Service Commission.

Attending the work shop are civil defense representatives and city and county officials from Oakland, Macomb and Wayne Counties and from Windsor, Canada.
