Christmas LIGHTING TIPS

One of the easiest and most effective ways to light your holiday doorway is with a 150-watt projector spot or floodlight.

General Electric holiday lighting specialists suggest that these weatherproof bulbs can be placed in commercially available holders and concealed in nearby shrubbery.

Place the units to one side of the door and direct them so that they will "light" your doorway decorations.

When putting up your Christmas lights along roof lines, gables or other out-of-reach spots, here are two tips from G-E holiday lighting specialists that will save time.

First, with bulbs in sockets, stretch strings of lights on ground and light them before mounting them on your house. The warm test can reveal burned-out bulbs quickly so they can be replaced before they are placed on the house. Tighten all bulbs firmly in sockets and check wiring and repair any defects or breaks.

To save time, mount your strings of outdoor lights on tiny brass cup hooks. These can be concealed under eaves, around windows or doorways and left in position year after year. The brass will not rust, and many homeowners who leave them up permanently have them painted along with their house so that they are most inconspicuous.

Insulated staples, found in most hardware stores, are also handy helps in mounting outdoor Christmas lights.

In school and college for a profession, a vocation, a career in business or industry. Vocational guidance and training is of vital importance, but of greater importance is the inculcation of the spirit of enterprise. Training without spirit is lifeless and doomed to failure. Time and again I have heard naturalized American citizens, from the four corners of the earth, say: "American citizenship is the greatest gift in the world!" And our native citizenry have taken it for granted. This fact poses another great responsibility for American education. The naturalized citizens are correct: American citizenship is priceless! But why?

The children of today need to know the answer. They need to understand our economic and political principles. They need to know the comparative advantages of life in America. They need to know how the advantages are brought about. They need to be made aware of their citizenship responsibilities - in safeguarding our system and improving the production and distribution of its great blessings. This is a big order. But I firmly believe American education is going to measure up.

Rare Canada Lynx Shot In Upper Peninsula

A rare Canada lynx was shot late last week in the upper peninsula's Delta County, 14 miles west of Rock.

The animal, a female, weighed 18 pounds and was bagged by Richard Ossewarde of Coopersville Conservation Department. Biologists identified the animal when Ossewarde was returning from a deer hunting trip.

Lynxes are almost never seen in Michigan and have never been common. One was shot last year near Dunbar in the eastern upper peninsula and probably migrated from Canada, where the animals are a bit more plentiful.

They have black-tipped ears, big feet and longer legs than the Michigan bobcat. Generally they grow to about the same weight as the bobcat.

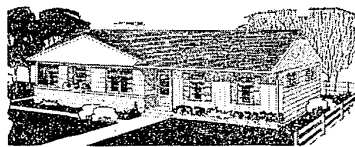
