Open Letter

Transportation Records Audited

(The following is a letter sent to O. E. Dunkel, superintendent of the Farmington Public Schools, relative to an audit of the School District's transportation records.)

The audit was requested by Superintendent Dunkel upon the instruction of the School Board.

Dear Mr. Dunkel: Your newly established transportation records have been audited by this office. It is found that your fleet of buses travels 466.3 miles daily in picking up students for delivery to schools. A total of 2,768 pupils is transported each day. This includes 249 pupils who live less than a mile from the school building they attend. Your net transportation load of pupils transported who live more than a mile from the schools equals 2,517.

From the above it has been determined that you pick up an average of 54 pupils per mile. This is determined by dividing the total eligible riders, 2,517, by your total pick up miles, 466.2. Under the terms of Section 6 of the Transportation Code, this places your district in the category of rate No. 2. Your mileage allowance for drivers' salaries, therefore, is \$1,333 per mile. Your total yearly mileage equals 100,800 miles. Your total mileage allowance, which includes allowance for drivers' salaries and other operation costs, equals \$2122 (\$1,333 plus \$789).

On the basis of the audit made it is certified that your district is doing all within its means to comply with the transportation policy of the State of Michigan. Your district has gone beyond the letter of the administrative code to provide transportation for all those needing it.

It is suggested that you continue your policy of concentrating pupils at pickup points. This practice not only produces a saving of time and expense in running your transportation system, but reduces the possibility of rear-end collisions.

Motion carried, all yeas.

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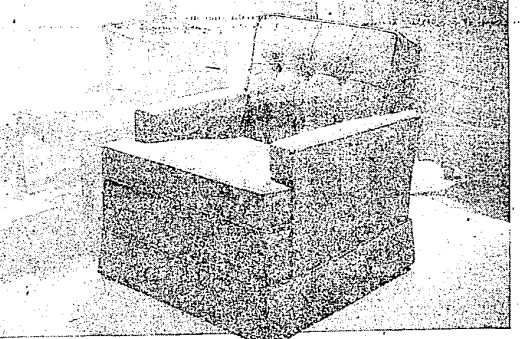

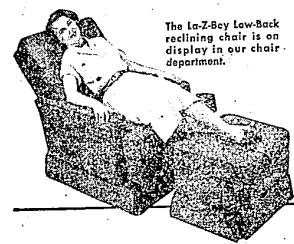
