Friends Of The Library See Whitman Collection, Hear Charles Feinberg

Members of the Farmington Friends of the Library and their friends last Tuesday evening heard a talk by Charles E. Feinberg about his experiences in making a collection of the works of Walt Whitman.

About 40 facsimile copies were on display in the library at the Farmington High School where the talk was given.

The meeting was opened by Donald Kosmisky, president of the Friends of the Library. Wendell Brown then introduced his personal friend, Mr. Feinberg, to the group.

In coming to Farmington to present his talk and show the Walt Whitman collection, Mr. Feinberg brought with him many pertinent photographs of Mr. Whitman and several first-edition copies of his works. Included in the copies was "Leaves of Grass," his best-known book of poems.

The international fame of Walt Whitman was evident, said Mr. Feinberg, by the fact that many of his works are translated into foreign languages. One of the earliest translations was made in 1920 by the Japanese and is the subject of study in many universities.

Efforts failed to retain the facsimile collection in Farmington for an entire week. The collection brought here by Mr. Feinberg was packed immediately after his talk for shipment to Minneapolis the next day.

While in Farmington, Mr. Feinberg spoke of his experiences with the collection.
