**Class To Visit Northville State Hospital Dec. 13**

On Tuesday, December 13, 36 senior high students of the Personal and Family Living class at Clarenceville High School will spend the day observing various care and treatment programs at Northville State Hospital.

Arrangements for the special pilot project were made with the hospital by the students' teacher, Mrs. Winifred Mummary, and Mr. Max A. Miller, principal of the school. The students for the first time will be able to observe the hospital's treatment program in action by visiting a treatment ward, family care home in the community, occupational therapy shop, make wards rounds with a social worker, and other areas where patients will be actively participating.

Groups of three and four students will visit at least three areas for three-quarters of an hour. They will then have lunch at the hospital, take a tour, and meet with members of Northville's clinical team. Each group is to make a report of what they had seen, in a discussion and question period will follow.

In speaking of the project, Dr. R. R. Yoder, assistant medical superintendent of Northville, states, "Our teenage students today should have the opportunity to get the facts about mental illness, its care and treatment, and its prevention, so they will be better able to meet this problem as adult citizens of the community tomorrow. We are hoping to take away the stigma of mental illness."

Dr. Yoder indicated that if the pilot plan proved to be workable, the project would become a part of the hospital's community program.
