It would increase the tax base, provide jobs, and add balance to the community. Dunckel said that he felt the Township Board could do a great deal to assist with the securing of favorable school sites through the development of a master plan. The members of the Board expressed concern over the fact that a master plan might require a great many changes in the present zoning of the Town ship.

Prior to the discussion on the master plan, the Board went into further detail on the possible establishment of a Charter Township. Several officials expressed the opinion that a Charter Township would be only an interim step toward the eventual incorporation as a city.
