

Elmer Garchow Fatally Injured

Elmer Garchow, 58, of 30710 Gable Street between Seven and Eight Mile Roads was fatally injured Tuesday morning when he was run over by a dump truck on Grandon Street just east of Merriman Road in Livonia.

Well known in the Farmington area, Garchow was employed with the City of Livonia as a Department of Public Works inspector.

The dump truck was operated by Robert Lee Young, 24, of 17th Street in Detroit. Young was cleared of blame in the accident following examination by the prosecutor's office.

Garchow died at the Wayne County General Hospital where he was taken following the accident. Funeral services will be held the latter part of this week.

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE, that a petition has been filed with the council of the city to re-zone certain premises within the city, which petition has been referred to the Planning Commission of the city and its recommendations received.
