

EARLY SNOWS MAY CAUSE FEED SHORTAGE FOR STATE'S DEER HERD, GAME CHIEF SAYS

Early heavy snows may spell trouble for Michigan's northern deer herd.

The Conservation Department's game chief, Harry D. Ruhl, reported at a recent Conservation Commission meeting that deer in the Lake Superior drainage were snowed in early in swamps and low areas. Confinement in these "deer yards" so early in the season means a long winter of short rations may be coming.

Commissioner J. P. Rahilly of Newberry asked that the Pearson Act and the camp deer law be studied for possible revision. The Pearson act allows landowners to delay part of tax payments until timber is cut and the camp deer law provides that a group of hunters can take one extra male deer for camp cooking purposes during deer season.

The Commission spent considerable time discussing "road hunting" in view of a recent attorney general's opinion that the Horton trespass law does not apply to the right-of-way, although other trespass laws continue in effect.

"No sportsman openly defends road hunting," said Department director Gerald E. Eddy, "and may be this attorney general's opinion will lead to early corrective legislation. We all certainly hope some answer can be found."

The Commission also unanimously agreed that a 700-acre tract of virgin red and white pine on Bois Blanc Island be considered for dedication as a wilderness area — if it can be obtained for state ownership. The U. S. Government presently owns the land.

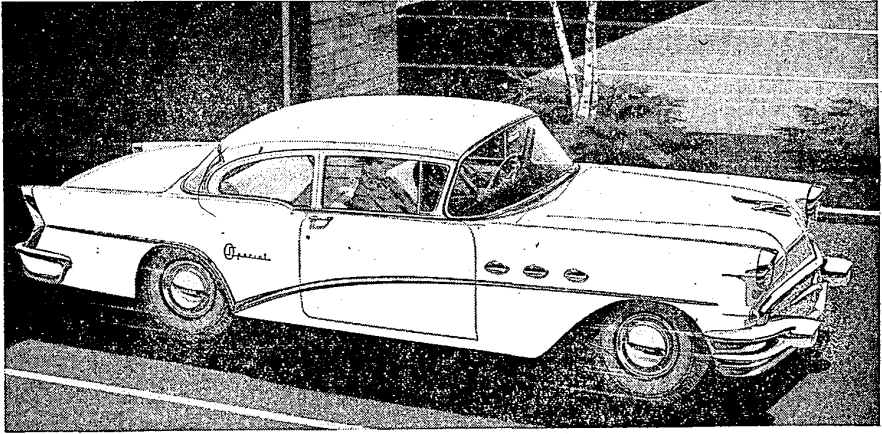
