START NEW YEAR WITH CHECK ON INSURANCES

The second insurance to check is your personal property insurance. Have you purchased anything new that should be covered in case of fire or theft? Or, is your insurance amount high enough to cover replacement of your belongings? Miss Nelson warns that many times our insurance would not cover replacement costs at present-day prices.

In concluding your insurance check, look up the dates on which your premium payments are due for your various policies. Mark the due dates with red pencil on your kitchen or desk calendar so you will remember to pay them on time and be well-protected throughout the year to come.

The canvass includes the circulating of questionnaires and the securing of signatures on petitions. The questionnaires are designed to provide necessary facts and figures regarding the water needs in the proposed district while the petitions will provide the authority for the establishment of a special assessment district and the financing of the project.

Chemical Used To Control Green Algae In Ponds

Delrad, an organic chemical compound derived from rotenone, has been found effective in the control of green algae in ponds.

Conservation Department fish specialists sprayed 10 ponds experimentally during 1954-55 and found Delrad "highly effective" against algae in hard water when used at a concentration of .66 parts per million.

Below 1.0 parts per million, the chemical did not appear to harm fish or fish food organisms.

Delrad is more convenient to use against algae than the more common copper sulfate, but its high cost (prohibits use in large-scale treatments).
