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### International Skaters To Appear In Hollywood Ice Revue At Olympia

Lovely Gundy Busch of Germany and Andra McLaughlin, the Swedish-Irish lass, are joined by Miss Lee, skating's newest find in the 1956 Hollywood Ice Revue. They are the feminine stars of the 21st annual revue, coming to Olympia for 26 performances February 1 through February 26.

This is the second year for Miss Busch, former world figure skating champion, in "The Show With The Stars." In the New York City Andra McLaughlin, it is her fifth season. It marks the debut of Miss Lee to ice extravaganza fans.

Margie is a younger sister of Carol Leane, who started in figure skating, until she retired to raise a family. She won fame as an ice ballerina abroad, being the rage of Paris for 18 months, before producer Arthur M. Wirtz lured her back to this country by signing her to a contract with the Hollywood Ice Revue.

Two other newcomers are Ria Baran and Paul Falk of Germany. They were six-time German roller skating champions - before they switched to ice skating, went on to win two European and the 1952 Olympia pair skating championships to climax their competitive careers.

Returning stars include such favorites as comedian Freddie Trenkler and the Three Brines: Monte Scott, Jim Rusch. Then there are handsome Jimmy Grogan and Skippy Baxter of the startling backward somersaults.

There are to be six big production numbers in the 18-act revue. Favorite among the children is Cinderella, with Margie Lee cast in the latter role and handsome Jimmy Grogan as her Prince.

Most sensational is Golden Dreams, a Japanese number featuring Margie Lee. The 30 chorus girls wear three-foot high bird cages as part of research work in lake management. An index and price list of maps available to the public can be obtained from the Conservation Department's Lansing office.

### CREWS START WORK OF MAPPING LOWER PENINSULA LAKES

Three Conservation Department crews started work January 3 with winter, lake mapping operations in the lower peninsula.

One mapping party will concentrate its work on 26 lakes in Crawford, Kalamazoo and Oshtemo Counties. Another crew will work on completing new and unfinished maps of 30 lakes in Oakland County and the third crew will cover 24 lakes in Kalamazoo, Lake, Mecosta, Newaygo and Osceola Counties.

To date, approximately 2400 lakes in the state have been mapped as part of research work in lake management. An index and price list of maps available to the public can be obtained from the Conservation Department's Lansing office.

The annual inventory of migratory waterfowl started January 3 and will continue through January 16. A total of 2200 state and federal game workers at the birds' wintering areas are making the inventory.

The survey is designed to study the distribution of wintering waterfowl and shifts in distribution resulting from major changes in land and water management. The inventory will range from southern Canada to Yucatan in southern Mexico.

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### PROMISE IMPROVED CONSERVATION RESEARCH PROGRAM

Conservation research in Michigan in 1956 will point to more accurate estimates of fish and game populations, improvement of fishing, better game coverage, control of forest diseases and insects and continued advancement of all resource management methods.

Dr. Martin W. Leonard, in charge of research for the Conservation Department, says more accurate information is needed on numbers of deer, moose, trout and bass that live in Michigan and the number of these creatures harvested each year by sportsmen.

Studies of warm-water fish will be stepped up in 1956 with the operation of a new experiment station at Hasletts, in Barry County. Formerly a state fish hatchery, the Hasletts site is being devoted for exclusive study of non-foot species.

Investigations will continue on the possibility of being able to plant two-year-old rainbow trout near mouths of streams with some assurance they will return to those streams after growing up in the Great Lakes.

Selective breeding experiments are planned to improve trout brood stock and the quality of predatory game fish.

In game research, the otter will come in for some intensive study to determine his significance as a predator and furbearer. Last year's experimental re-introductions of wild turkeys also will be followed closely.

Flooding projects will be evaluated to predict their usefulness to waterfowl, furbearers and fish.

Pathologists will study parasites and diseases affecting fish and game. A new virus disease which killed some deer during the fall of 1955 will come in for intensive investigation.

Conservation research, said Dr. Leonard, will be kept flexible to meet unpredictable situations. "In management of fish, game, forests and other renewable resources, changes are inevitable and research must point to changes in management if we are to keep production of these resources in step with public demand."

figured that the House should represent the population, the Senate area and interests.

"That's the way Congress is chosen and we can follow precedent," said Senator Creighton B. Coleman (R-Battle Creek).

Republicans were angered by advertising of opponents to the plan, despite its victory. They passed a law in 1932 requiring the listing of sponsors of any advertisement - in radio, television or newspapers - involving a constitutional issue.

Republicans charged last month that labor unions, under the title of "some group organized to help mentally retarded children" placed advertising opposing them in the legislation.

Union officials immediately denied any conspiracy to attack the Senate, Republicans or others.

But three Republican lawmakers, Senators Coleman, Carliston H. Morris (R-Kalamazoo) and House Speaker Wade Van Valkenberg (R-Kalamazoo), drafted a new version of the law.

They said they would introduce a bill requiring the sponsors to be listed in any advertisement involving any public question and not hide behind some phantom committee title.

If the bill passes, the wraps will be taken off dozens of issues, but whether it is a good thing remains for the people to decide, the people who go to the polls on election day.
