The representative is available for consultation on the first and third Wednesdays of each month at the Farmington City Municipal Building. Hours are from 10 to 11 a.m. on those days.

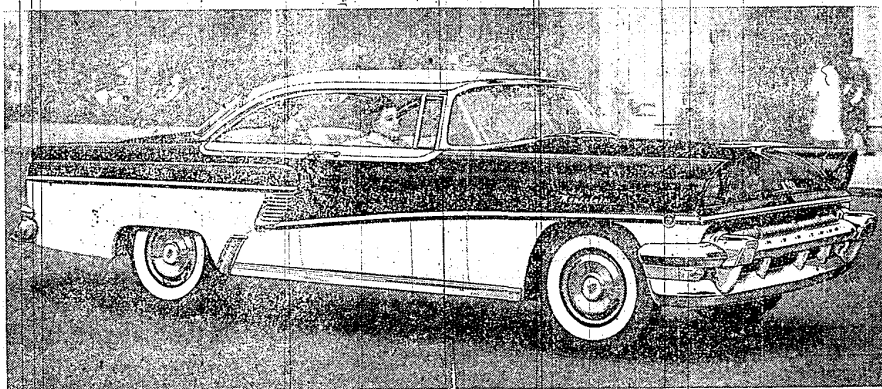
Kendallwood Residents Invited To Card Party
