School Installs New P.A. System

During the Christmas vacation there was a new addition at Clarenceville High School. An intercommunication system was installed. The sound system was purchased from the Sound Systems of Buffalo, New York, at the total cost of \$249.12. This is to be paid for in six yearly installments from Student Activity funds. The 1955 magazine drive paid for the first installment.

The system included: 26 "8" classroom speakers, 20 "12" gymnasium speakers, and two other broadcast points outside of the office, including the gymnasium and cafeteria.

At present the daily use includes an informational broadcast in the morning and music to the cafeteria during lunch periods. In the future, radio broadcasting will be presented as well as student and Student Council broadcasts.

REGISTRATION NOTICE FOR SPECIAL ELECTION TUESDAY, FEBRUARY 21, 1956

To the Qualified Electors of the TOWNSHIP OF FARMINGTON, COUNTY OF OAKLAND, STATE OF MICHIGAN

Notice is hereby given that in conformity with the "Michigan Election Law," I, the undersigned Clerk, will, upon any day except Sunday and a legal holiday, the day of any regular or special election or primary election, receive the registration or the name of any voter in said Township, City or Village not already registered who may APPLY TO ME PERSONALLY for such registration. Provided, however, that I can receive no names for registration during the time intervening between the Thirtieth day before said regular, special or official primary election and the day of such election.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT I WILL BE AT MY OFFICE SATURDAY, JAN. 21, 1956

The Thirtieth day preceding said Election

As provided by Sec. 3, Chapter 3, Part II, P. A. 305, 1939 and Sec. 1, Chapter 3, Part II, P. A. 1939, Act 31, P. A. 1941, Act 291, P. A. 1945 and Act 108, 1951.

From 8 o'clock a.m. until 8 o'clock p.m. on said day for the purpose of REVIEWING the REGISTRATION and REGISTER-ING such of the qualified electors in said TOWNSHIP, CITY or VILLAGE as SHALL PROPERLY apply therefor.

The name of no person but an ACTUAL RESIDENT of the precinct at the time of registration, and entitled under the constitution, if remaining such resident, to vote at the next election, shall be entered in the registration book.

ELECTOR UNABLE TO MAKE PERSONAL APPLICATION, PROCEDURE

SEC. 16. Any elector who is unable to make personal application for registration because of physical disability or absence from the Township, City or Village at which his legal residence is located, may be registered at the close of registration before any election or primary election by securing from the Clerk of the Township, City or Village in which is located his legal residence, duplicate registration cards and executing in duplicate the registration card and attaching a notary public or other officer legally authorized to administer oaths and returning such registration cards to the Clerk of the Township, City or Village before the close of office hours on the last day of registration prior to any election or primary election. The notary public or other officer administering the oath shall sign his name on the line for the signature of the registration officer and designate his title.

REGISTRATION OF ELECTORS REQUIRED: REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY, IDENTIFICATION OF ELECTOR

SEC. 17. The inspectors of election at any election or primary election in this State, or in any District, County, Township, City or Village thereof, shall not receive the vote of any person whose name is not registered in the registration book of the precinct in which he offers to vote; but the name of a qualified elector may be registered on the day of any election or primary election up to 4 p.m. of said day. Provided, That he shall, under oath, state that he is a resident of such precinct, is at least 21 years of age and has resided in the State for at least 6 months, and in the Township or City 30 days next preceding such election, designating particularly the place of his residence, and that he possesses the other qualifications of an elector, and that owing to the sickness or bodily infirmity of himself, or of some member of his family, or owing to his absence from the Township or City on public or private business, and without intent to avoid or delay his registration, he was unable to make application for registration on the first day set for such registration. Provided Further, That he or she is accompanied and identified by a registered voter known to a member of the election board. Provided Further, That the Board of Supervisors of any County may by resolution duly adopted discontinue the registration of electors on primary and election days and such registrations shall not be taken in such County thereafter on primary and election days unless and until the Board of Supervisors rescinds its action in connection therewith.

TRANSFER OF APPLICATION; APPLICATION, TIME

SEC. 18. Any registered elector may upon change of residence within the Township, City or Village cause his registration to be transferred to his new address by sending to the Clerk a written request, stating his present address, the date he moved thereto and the address from which he was last registered; or by applying in person for a transfer. The Clerk shall strike through the last address, ward and precinct number and record the new address, ward and precinct number on the original and duplicate registration cards, and shall place the original registration card in proper precinct file. Such transfers shall not be made within the 30 days next preceding any election or primary election, provided that no such transfer shall permit any person to vote in any Township, City or Village in which he had not resided 30 days next preceding any election or primary election.

TRANSFER OF REGISTRATION ON ELECTION DAY

SEC. 20. Any registered elector who has removed from one election precinct of a Township, City or Village to another election precinct of the same Township, City or Village shall have the right to make application to have his registration transferred on any election or primary election day by executing a request over his or her signature for such transfer and presenting the same to the election board in the precinct in which he is registered. Upon receiving such request the inspectors of election shall charge of the registration records shall compare the signature thereon with the signature upon the applicant's registration record and if the signatures correspond then the inspector shall certify such fact upon said request and the applicant shall transfer shall be permitted to vote in such precinct for that election only. The application for transfer shall be filed with the Township, City or Village Clerk who shall transfer such voter's registration in accordance with the application. When the name of any elector in the Township, City or Village has been changed, it shall be the duty of the Township, City or Village Clerk to make the change to show the proper name of street in the registration records, and it shall not be necessary for the elector to change his registration with respect thereto in order to be eligible to vote. When the residence house numbers of any section of a Township, City or Village have been changed, such change shall not affect the right of such voter to cast his vote. Corresponding change in the registration records may be made by the Clerk or upon election day upon proper showing.
