Male Voices Needed In Music Department

"There is a need for boys' voices, tenors, basses and baritone in the vocal music department," stated Mr. William Feucht, director.

One-quarter credit for each semester is given for Boys' Glee Club and Mixed Chorus. As much as two credits can be gained toward graduation.

No formal tryouts are held and any homework of the course is done in class. Grades are determined by the extent of participation in concerts.

Mr. Feucht urged more support for the band as well as the vocal department.
