Clarenceville

School Children Getting Special Education Help

A report was given last week on the education program now being conducted in the Clarenceville Public Schools.

The report indicated that at the present time two children are attending the special orthopedic room at the Eagle School in Farmington and that one other child of pre-school age has been certified for this service. It was also revealed that four other students have been listed for screening to obtain the service.

In a recent check up, 137 pupils in grades kindergarten through sixth were found to have speech problems. Since only a portion of them can be helped, another examination is being made to determine the worst cases. They will receive immediate help. Attempts are now being made to acquire a full-time speech correctionist for the school system; it was pointed out.

Another program is being conducted in the school system, the report stated, to help handicapped pupils. A psychologist visits the school one day each week to test those students. A screening committee, consisting of the psychologist, the school referral consultant, the principal, teacher and local school consultant, then meet to determine the most advantage help which can be provided for the handicapped children.

Five pupils have been referred for the services of the hearing and vision consultants and 13 others have been turned over to a visiting teacher for special help. It was indicated in the report that the Clarenceville School system will be eligible for a full-time visiting teacher by the beginning of the next school year.

ism. It is vitally necessary for our American boys and girls of high school and college age to understand these facts. Until they do, they cannot intelligently resist Communism and Socialism.

The seventh film of the series, "A Look at Capitalism," recognizes that there is more than one kind of "capitalism." American capitalism is unique. The European form of cartel capitalism and other forms are noted. Then the film builds the basic structure of American capitalism. The pillars are: (1) private ownership of property, (2) the profit motive, and (3) the competitive free market. How each of these elements perform in the working of the American system is shown through illustrations.

To bring capitalism down into the everyday life of everybody, this film shows Dr. Clifton Gaus, the classroom instructor of the series, buying 10 cents worth of candy. With it he molds a child's toy. When it has been baked in his oven, it sells for 39 cents. The cycle, from money (capital) to the marketing of the goods, brings in to being all the elements of the great system which has lifted America's living standard, so high above that of the rest of the world.

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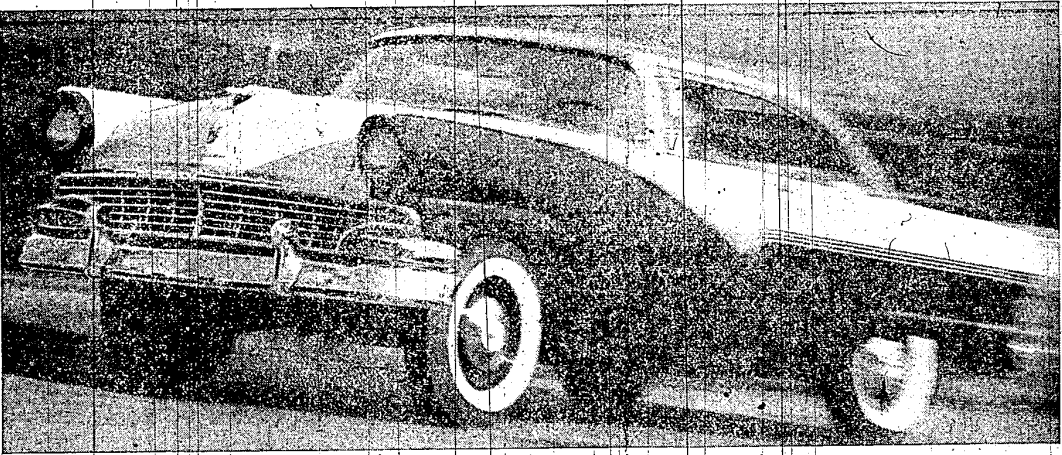
