## Baptist Church Buys Parking Area

In order to facilitate parking for those attending worship services and to comply with the off-street parking codes of the City of Farmington, members of the First Baptist Church met in a special business session Wednesday, January 16.

Discussion was held on the purchase of the Tabb property on the north side of Shiawassee. It was agreed to purchase the property subject to the approval of the Board of Appeals of the City that the area be used for off-street parking. On Thursday, January 19, necessary permission was received and the purchase is now being completed.

Approximately one year ago the property immediately west of the church was secured for the future, to be erected soon. The most recent acquisition will solve much of the parking and traffic problem for the church and the community in the future. The property is large enough to accommodate two hundred or more automobiles. It is felt that the service will contribute much to the effectiveness of the church in the future.

Well Baby Clinic  
Set For Feb. 1

The Wayne County Health Department, with the assistance of the Livonia Health Guild, will hold its monthly Well Baby Clinic on Wednesday, February 1, at 1 p.m. The clinic will be held in the community room of the First Federal Savings and Loan Association at Sheldon Center.

The clinic is for the benefit of "well" children from three months to five years of age.

Children will receive physical examinations at regular intervals and protection against smallpox, diphtheria, tetanus and whooping cough. In addition, their mothers may discuss with the doctor any problems regarding diet, behavior or general care of her child.

There is a pediatrician at each clinic, along with volunteer help from the local health guild.

The clinic is not designed to treat sick children but to prevent "well" children from becoming ill.
