Local students named as honor students were Loren R. Clifford, the University Union Building as a part of a display arranged by Mortar Board, campus honorary for senior women.

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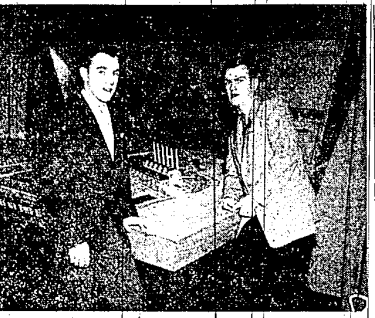

Rudy Golla, Detroit Edison College Grant Winner, Honored Recently

Rudolph Golla, of 10247 Overdale, Farmington, has been honored by the Detroit Edison Company as one of thirty-five students awarded college grants by the company in 1955. Rudy is a graduate of Farmington High School and is now in his first year of college at Lawrence Institute of Technology.

The one-year scholarships were given to January and June, 1955, high school graduates "coming in the company's service area. Winners were selected by Michigan collegiate institutions on the basis of scholastic ability, character, citizenship and extra-curricular school activities. College grants will be offered to high school graduates again this year.

More than one hundred visitors, including students, their parents and friends, were welcomed at Edison's main office in Detroit by Sylvester F. Leahy, manager of employee relations for the company, at a Scholarship Day program held there last week.

Walker L. Custer, president of Detroit Edison, addressed the guests at luncheon. Included in the all-day program was a tour of several work groups in the general office area, an illustrated talk on company operations, a special film showing, and the presentation of gifts to scholarship students.

The 1955 winners, representing 28 Michigan colleges and universities, came from some 16 communities throughout Detroit Edison's 7,600-square-mile service area, which extends from the tip of Michigan's Thumb to below Monroe, and from near Lansing to the state's eastern border.
