 This huge debt — and this is about as much as all the taxpayers in America — corporations and individuals — were paying for all Federal governmental services just 20 years ago, in 1935.

Senator Harry F. Byrd, Democrat of Virginia and widely acknowledged authority on public finance, and Senator Styles Bridges, Republican of New Hampshire, ranking minority member of the Senate Appropriations Committee, have jointly introduced a resolution in Congress providing for a constitutional amendment which would prohibit an unbalanced federal budget — except in times of war or other national emergency. If approved by Congress and the states, the amendment would require Congress to stay in session each year until it had produced a balanced budget by reduction in expenditures, increased revenue, or both. This legislative step commands the serious attention of any citizen interested in his personal welfare and the future of his nation.

Dear Sirs:  
 Nearly everyone in the Farmington area is aware, or should be aware, of the serious school problems which face us in the community in the years ahead. It is apparent at this time that more and more schools will be needed each year in the Farmington School District and more and more teachers needed to train the students who will be enrolled in these schools.

I am wondering, however, how many people are aware of the serious school problems which confront us on a National level, and eventually become our problems on a local level as well.

The following information is taken from a report on the National school problem which appeared in the "Kiplinger Letter" recently which I thought might be of interest to readers of The Enterprise.

"Ten years from now, 23 per cent more children will be entering elementary schools than today, 55 per cent more in high schools, and 40 per cent more in

colleges. We will need some 600,000 more classrooms to accommodate them — a jump of about 60 per cent.

"We'll also need 200,000 more teachers every year for ten years to cover school growth and to replace those who quit or retire. "The main problem, of course, is money, which in the end means more taxes. The cost of schools, public and private, now is eight to ten billion dollars a year. In the next ten years this may double and most of it must come from taxes.

"What kind of taxes will support the schools? Mostly property taxes, for already nearly 45 per cent of the property taxes collected in states go to the schools. So there will be higher local taxes, higher property assessments, and fewer exemptions."

The latest highway safety issue before the legislature is a school for poor drivers.

Sixteen legislatures are pushing for the plan for counties over 30,000 population. The same idea was killed during the special session last November which was dedicated to highway safety.

The plan would require drivers who get three tickets in two years to enroll in a local driver's school, organized by the State Police commissioner, the sheriff, local prosecutor and the chief law enforcement officer of the largest city or village in the county.

The driver would be required to pay a \$5 tuition fee for a six-week course. Course standards would be fixed by the State Police.

Democrats are opposed to the idea because it takes the standardizing duties away from the office of secretary of State.

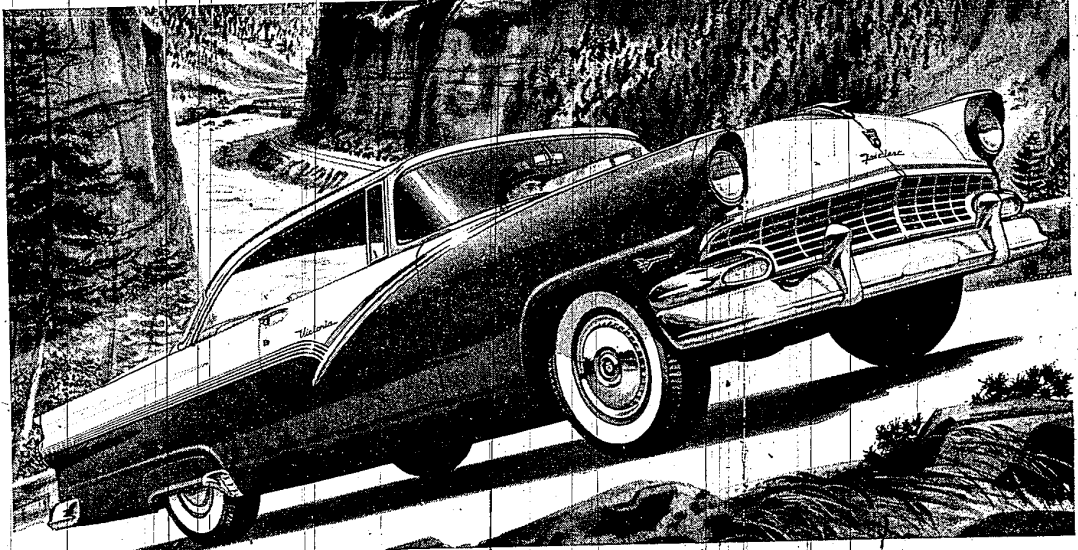

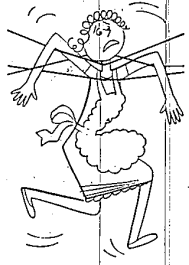
