

A.U.W. Hears Talk On Diabetic Camps

At a meeting of the Association of Universalist Women held recently at Adams Hall, Robert Vail of Boston gave an enlightening talk on the Clara Barton and Eliot P. Joslin Diabetic Camps, owned and operated by the Universalist Women's group. Vail is director of the two camps.

The Clara Barton camp for girls was the first camp of its kind and was started 24 years ago. In 1948 the Universalist Women started the Joslin camp for diabetic boys.

All diabetic children between the ages of 5 and 15 years are accepted at the camps. Vail stated. The camps are operated as non-sectarian and non-profit organizations. Children of many races and creeds attend. The Barton camp last year served girls from 19 states and three foreign countries, and boys attended Joslin camp from 19 states and four foreign countries. Vail told local Universalist women.

Vail pointed out that children often arrive at the camps very ill, but are usually much improved in health before the season is over. They build up confidence in themselves, he concluded, while both they and their parents are taught how a diabetic can live a perfectly normal life.
