COLONIAL DINNER PLANNED BY NEW CHURCH COMMITTEE

Bethel Baptist Church Plans Unity Dedication, Week-Long Program Set

On Sunday, March 6, 1956, the charter members of the Bethel Baptist Church of Farmington held their first joint services in the Clarenceville Seventh Day Adventist Church. Since that time the growth of the church has been continuous.

Plans to acquire a permanent location were put into operation less than four months after the first services were held. The result was the purchase of a nine-acre estate at the corner of Farmington Road and Colfax, half-way between Eight and Nine Mile Roads. On this property was a modern home which is now being used as the church parsonage, and a building which has since been converted into a chapel. Soon a new addition was made to the chapel. This annex makes it possible to accommodate Sunday School space, kitchen, rest rooms, office, and furnace room. A large parking lot adjoins the building.

Soon after organizing, the Bethel Baptist Church called the Reverend Frank B. Smith, of Detroit, as pastor. Mr. Smith has had wide experience in the evangelistic field and has held successful pastorate in Cass City and Detroit, and Wallaceburg, Ontario.

The Bethel Baptist Church is independent of organic affiliation with any association, convention, or other organization, and is thoroughly evangelical in doctrine and practice.

During the week of March 6 through 10, just as the first services, the Bethel Baptist Church will dedicate their first unit in its building program. Services will be held each evening at 7:30 p.m. The dedication program will feature well-known guest preachers, and music furnished by guest musicians and the church choir. The musical ministry of the church will be under the direction of Mrs. Eleanor Scharchburg, an excellent musician, singer, and choir leader.

The week-long dedication program will begin at 11 a.m. services on Sunday, March 6.
