### U-M To Conduct Survey On Lives Of C. H. S. Girls

The Survey Research Center of the University of Michigan has been conducting a student research as part of a national study of the lives and thinking of high school girls of this generation. Clarenceville is one of the three schools chosen from the State of Michigan to participate.

Mrs. Lois Moore and Mrs. Dorothy Muller, representatives from U. of M. are interviewing girls from the ninth and eleventh grades, chosen by lot.

Personal habits, health information, home and family environment, school life, activities, social life, education and marital plans are among topics covered in the interview.

All interviews and participation are voluntary, and the girls' names remain anonymous.

Material derived from the project on a national basis will be used by social and educational institutions to determine the needs of adolescent girls.

Army Pvt. John C. McCaffrey, son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles E. McCaffrey, 21790 Farmington Road, took part in a field demonstration of most modern electrical treatment at Fort Sam Houston, Texas, on March 2.

The demonstration was held by the Army Medical Service School for high ranking Army and civilian medical and administrative officers. It illustrated how trained medical Army personnel would treat patients according to wounds and evacuate them for further medical care, in the event of an atomic attack.

McCaffrey entered the Army in August, 1955, and completed basic training at Fort Carson, Colorado. He was graduated from Farmington High School in 1954.

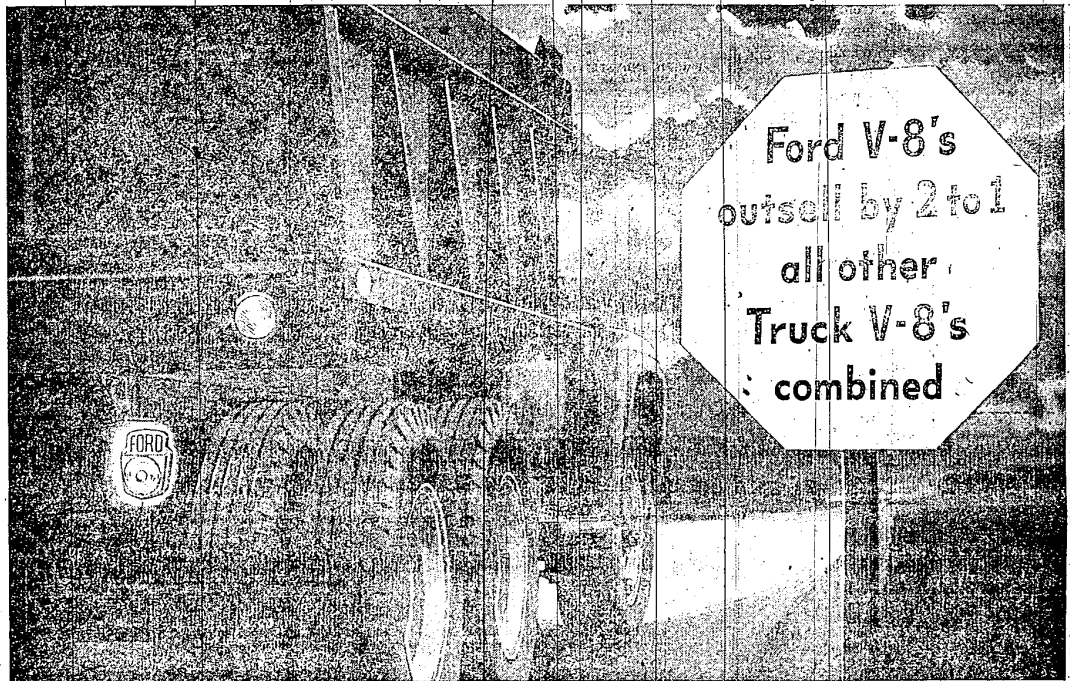

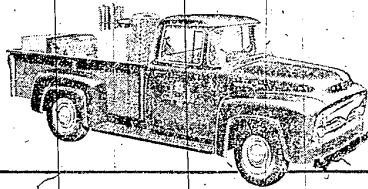
