Not So Simple...

Gentlemen: The issue involving the transporting of parochial school children is anything but "simple," as stated in the letter printed in The Enterprise on March 8. In my humble opinion, anything as unconstitutional as this is not "simple."

I think that a few more facts regarding this issue should be brought out. First of all, the State Aid, out of which the transportation fund is taken, is based on the number of students in school on the 4th Friday in September. The transportation fund is based on the mileage traveled in October and amended again in February. The necessary survey has been taken. Who is going to cover the great deficit which is bound to occur between now and next survey in September? We are taking on approximately 1,000 more students?

It has also been mentioned that the parochial schools would turn over four almost new buses to the township to help in transporting the children. These buses are not paid for and it is assumed that the township will take over these payments. However, when a new bus is purchased it is paid for by the township funds and reimbursed over a period of 7 years by the State Aid fund. Yes, we eventually get our money back, but not for 7 years. The original money must come from somewhere!

We, here in Farmington, at the present time are laboring under a great problem of providing enough schools and transportation for the great influx of children which is occurring every week. How then is it possible to accommodate approximately 1,000 more children all at once? The school aid does not cover the expenses now. There was a deficit of \$12,000 last year and will possibly be more this year. How, then, can added children, buses, and more expenses make this deficit less?

Let's not bite off more than we can chew. Let's see to it that our public school children are taken care of first, which is, after all, what we are paying tax for!
