Happy Ending With A "Familiar Ring"

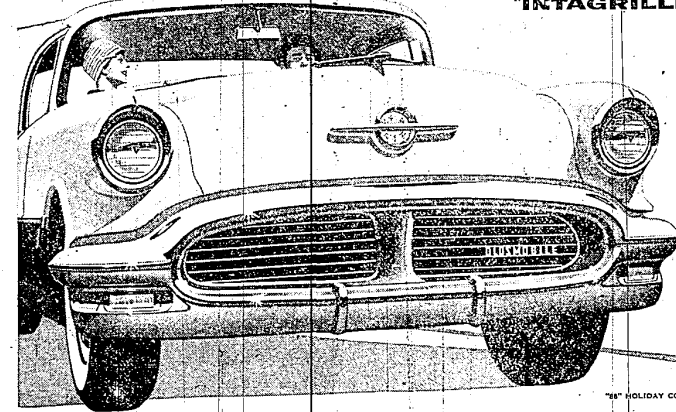
