COUNCIL PROCEEDINGS

Regular meeting of the Council of the City of Farmington held in the Council Chamber on Monday, April 2, 1956 at 8:00 p.m.

Roll Call: Bates, Cavanaugh, Calkins, Chapman, Lindbergh. All present.

2. Minutes of Previous Meeting: Minutes approved as submitted, on motion of Cavanaugh and supported by Chapman.

3. Petitions and Communications:
a. Letter re: Sidewalks at Farmington Road and Aldo Loma Drive, (from Jack Reinken)
City Manager will make a complete survey of the sidewalk situation in this area as well as Liberty and State Streets and make a report at the next meeting of the Council. This report to also include the drainage situation on the East side of Miller Road.
b. Letter from Carl W. Shaw, 31831 Valleyview re: Storm Sewer. City Manager will instruct Harvey Blough, Supt. of Water and Sewer Department to make a survey of this situation and have his report ready for the next meeting of the Council.
c. Letter from Friends of Library: read and placed in file.
d. Letter from Michigan Municipal League re: Seventh Annual Regional Meeting.

6. Miscellaneous Business
a. Closing of Valley View east of Valley View Circle. Suggested by City Manager examine this street and see what work needs to be done.
b. Designate terms of office for appointees to Library Board of Trustees.
Appointees: Howard Thayer and C. Goddard Smith. Terms: one for 4 years — one for two years.
Motion made by Cavanaugh that C. Goddard Smith be appointed for four years and Howard Thayer be appointed for two years. All Yes, carried.

ECONOMY HIGHEST WHEN FREEZER IS FULLY STOCKED

There's no economy in an empty or partially-filled freezer.

The more turnover of frozen foods in your home freezer, the greater the economy in using this appliance. It costs more than twice as much per pound to store 300 pounds of food for a year in a home freezer than to store and use 900 pounds from the same freezer during the year.

This includes the cost of the food itself, say researchers at the U. S. Department of Agriculture. As more food is used and replaced in a freezer, storage costs are spread over a larger number of pounds, and cost per pound decreases.

Household equipment specialists point out that the cost of a freezer operation are relatively large compared to other costs — such as that for wrapping — which is much less than the amount of food handled by the freezer. Whether the freezer is empty or full, researchers have found that the electricity required to hold zero F. remains the same.

Besides amount of frozen food, the cost of electrical energy to operate a home freezer depends on the amount and effectiveness of its insulation, room temperature, size of the unit, temperature at which the freezer is operated, and of course, the cost of electricity.

SEARCH FOR DEAD DEER IN NORTH TO START SOON

Final plans have been worked out for a search for dead deer in the upper and northern lower peninsulas.

The survey will be conducted as soon as weather conditions permit, probably in early April. In order to sight deer carcasses, Conservation Department workers must start the search after several consecutive days of thawing temperatures, but before low areas are flooded.

Because of early snows and severe weather this winter, the state's deer herd has been in critical condition in many areas and it is feared that starvation has taken a heavy toll.

To determine the extent of loss, Department workers will search a system of 16-acre plots selected at random throughout the northern deer country. The results of these searches then will be applied to the total area and an accurate estimate of starvation will be computed. This method, also used last year, was devised by statisticians from the Department, Michigan State University and the University of Michigan.

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Bell Plans Huge Expansion In '56

The Michigan Bell Telephone Company will spend \$22,000 to expand and improve service in this area during 1956, according to Robert D. Maurer, area manager.
Maurer said the local figure is a part of the company's record-high \$91,000,000 construction program for this year. The huge outlay, he said, will be required to meet the unrelenting demand for service throughout the firm's territory.
He pointed out that the 1955 program would raise Michigan Bell's postwar construction expenditures here to nearly \$2,500,000.
Since 1946, telephones here have increased from 2,430 to 8,400 — more than triple in the ten-year period.
Maurer pointed to the company's accelerated merchandising program as "an important factor influencing telephone growth and the type of service available to users in the future."

"The trend toward two or more telephones — and telephone lines — in homes will move rapidly during the next few years, just as many homes have two or more cars and two or more automobiles. Colored telephones will become increasingly popular. So will such special telephone devices as the hands-free 'Speakerphone' and the automatic answering equipment known as 'Amanda'."

Continuing toward its goal of converting all remaining manually-operated exchanges to dial, the company this year has scheduled dial systems for Ypsilanti, Niles, Buchanan, Mantol, Marion, McBean, Unionville, and Gagetown.

As the state's fourth largest employer, the company has 67,600 employees in the hundreds of communities it serves.
