Each person voting on the proposition to borrow money and to issue bonds must be a citizen of the United States, above the age of twenty-one (21) years, and have resided in the State of Michigan six (6) months and in the School District thirty (30) days next preceding the day of election, and must be the owner of property assessed for taxes within the School District, or the lawful husband or wife of such owner.

Only registered voters are eligible to vote.

TAKE NOTICE that the Board of Education has estimated that Seven Hundred Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$750,000) is the amount of money necessary to be borrowed for the purpose above mentioned.

(Continued from Page 2B) educational material to the development by the National Education Program of our new integrated film series, "The American Adventure," and effective techniques for using these films in the classrooms of America. The new series is being enthusiastically received.

Religious conviction was the other basic character requirement which Major Mayer's studies found to be deficient in too many American soldiers. "A really convinced religious person... (whose) religion had been a part of his whole life, if his family were organized along lines of religious training and the moral and ethical precepts of such training... such a man," the Major found, "often was able to defend himself and his principles (against the Red indoctrination)." To be at its greatest strength, he said, religious faith or deep spiritual morality must be inculcated in the individual early in life, in the home and in early school experiences.

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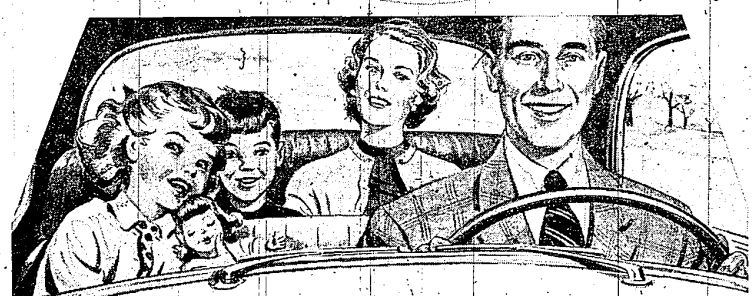
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
