Transportation Reply

To the Editor: Subject — school bus question. In your letter box column of last week, "Parent and Taxpayer" comments upon two basic issues. I wish you would please publish my views as a rebuttal.

On the first issue, direct aid to private school or church most certainly does violate the very sound principle of "Separation of Church and State," but any amount of direct aid to individuals does not.

Shall a policeman, for instance, refrain from helping Catholic children safely across streets because by so doing he is indirectly helping their church? Denying one citizen or a million any tax supported service because of creed is discrimination. Discrimination against religion in general becomes ireligion which is in itself a religion and when practiced by the State, tends to make ireligion the official State religion, against a violation of our fundamental principle. Discrimination against one religion is persecution. It follows therefore that the only legitimate process consistent with freedom of religion is to aid all individuals regardless of creed.

On the second issue, "Parent and Taxpayer" implies some sort of discrimination to the parent who does not conform to the "one school idea," and that therefore we should be content to pay double taxes to the parent who does not conform to the "one school idea." Only some mental service involved, not identified with one of our basic freedoms.

However, in this country, think of our Bill of Rights, "Freedom of Education" which guarantees the right to each parent to choose a school for his children. To attempt to exercise this right is not to deny or unprincipled, but the contrary most patriotic. With the right encouragement, other denominations might sponsor private schools so that that parent who even if he is not a Jew, might have freedom of choice.

Restricting the use of public facilities to the use of government "one schoolers" only, compels less prosperous citizens to conform and is an inequity. Shall only rich citizens enjoy Freedom of Education?

Just because we have been backward in making for our rights, no reason that an unfair Status Quo should be perpetuated, called a wedge towards something sinister.

I believe that the State and every local community should look constructively on this problem. Education is the most economical commodity we can purchase, which will give rich returns to all. We need more and more schools, and with encouragement, private schools can flourish together with government schools.

A healthy rivalry between them should help both. Competition breeds excellence, monopoly breeds mediocrity. No job or salary of teacher or administrator need ever suffer if our government helps its citizens keep private enterprise in education alive.

Lastly, I believe that not all our non-Catholic neighbors are unappreciative of our double burdened and that only a few wish to perpetuate current inequities.

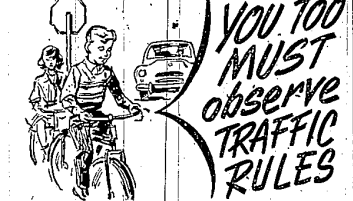
