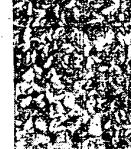

natural water drainage south to Grand River Avenue. On Hawthorne Street north of Shawnee, where a different situation exists, ditches will be cut to the lowest-point in the road and an underground line will cross private property to a natural stream. Drainage of Gill Road was also discussed. Authorization was granted to cut a drainage ditch along the east side of the road. Attempts will also be made to have the County improve drainage along the west side of the road in the Township.

Other action included the setting aside of two lots at Oakland and Gill Roads as a junior play-ground site and the passing of a resolution prohibiting owners of any buildings from draining roofs into sanitary sewers or combination storm and sanitary sewers.

Monday, May 7, was set by the Council as the date when the proposed revised city zoning ordinance will be read and acted upon. Titled for later consideration was an elm tree or general tree ordinance, offer of a quit claim deed by Detroit Edison to a 12-foot easement along Shawnee Road and a petition by City policemen for consideration of more substantial salary increases. Consideration of higher salaries for policemen will be taken up at the budget hearing on Monday, April 23.

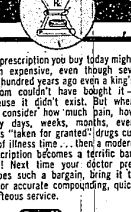

the staff. Following some discussion Dan Duquet moved that the budget allocation for police salaries be increased to \$23,000. Eagle stated that the \$17,500 salary item in the proposed budget allows for the hiring of additional personnel. After a further discussion a vote was taken and the motion was defeated.

During the discussion on the police proposal, a question was raised regarding the source of funds for these increased appropriations. Joseph DeMarco, member of the Board of Review, stated that approximately \$5,000.00 had been added to the assessment rolls this year on personal property. Following this statement Eagle declared that DeMarco was out of order. After a brief exchange a motion was made and approved from the floor allowing DeMarco to continue. He referred to Eric Blanchard, Township Supervisor and Assessor, who passed away last week, and stated that he, DeMarco, had not signed the real estate property roll because in his opinion the assessments were not fully correct.

Bob Harris, member of the Board of Review, stated that DeMarco's reference to Blanchard was uncalled for at this time. He stated that 34 property owners appeared before the Board of Review regarding their assessments. He stated that the entire Board checked all of the properties and that DeMarco agreed at that time with the decisions. Harris pointed out that it is not 48 respondents of the Board of Review who assess property. He concluded that the Township has a competent assessing officer and that he is doing a good job.

Herbert Neal raised a question on the \$15,000 allocation for road repair. In the proposed budget, stating that it was not sufficient, Caleb Moore pointed out that any appropriation by the Board to a subsidy to the County Road Commission and that they are unable to fill all the requests that are made. It was moved by Herbert Chellman that a recommended \$50,000 be appropriated for road repair and maintenance. The motion was seconded and carried.

Howard Weiss moved that the budget be adopted as amended, and the motion was approved. With the additions, the expenditures listed in the 1956-57 budget total \$23,000. While the estimated receipts are \$161,900. If all of the appropriations are expended, the balance will have come from the \$168,394 surplus as listed in the financial statement, officials stated.

At the close of the meeting John Spicer proposed a resolution instructing the Board to enact an ordinance prohibiting the issuance of any further building permits for any site in the Township until the owner can prove that proper water and sanitary facilities are available. Al Gain, Building Inspector, stated that this is already being done as far as water facilities are concerned. Mr. Fisher, Old Colony Subdivision, stated that 22 septic tanks in the area have been installed, all of them improperly. Leonard stated that he would have to investigate the legality of whether or not the electors have the authority to pass such a resolution at the Township meeting. He promised, however, to submit his opinion to the Board regarding the question. The motion was put to a vote and carried.

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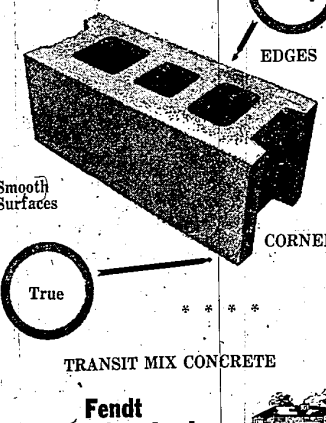
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
