

### SUMMER SESSIONS BEING SCHEDULED AT CRANBROOK

Kingswood School Cranbrook will inaugurate an academic summer session this year for the first time in its history. The session will begin June 18 and run for six weeks, and will be open to boys as well as girls.

Enrollment is open to students who, by June 18, will have completed the 10th, 11th or 12th grades, whether or not they have enrolled in Kingswood or Cranbrook during the regular school year. All registrations must be completed by June 11.

The curriculum will include art history, the classics, English, Spanish, French and social studies. Courses are, non-credit and no formal examinations will be given. Classroom sessions will be held from nine until twelve every morning Monday through Friday, and students may elect one or two courses. For a small additional fee students may swim in Cranbrook's Jonah Pool after classes.

Visiting summer session faculty members will be Russell McLaughlin, former drama critic of the Detroit News; Miss Margo Cramer, curator of Cranbrook Academy of Art Galleries; and Mr. John Ormond, staff chairman of public affairs for the Y. W. C. A. who recently returned from a two and a half years' stay in India.

Regular Kingswood faculty members who will teach in the summer school will be Miss E. Bennett, chairman of the English department; Mrs. A. S. Smith, Spanish; Mrs. E. Steven Bauer and Miss Grace Larson, history; Miss Kathryn Myers, French; and Miss Joan McBride, Latin.

### COUNTIES ASKED TO FLY STATE FLAG IN MICHIGAN WEEK

Officials there want the flag, which has not had much prominence, except in official offices, flying from every county courthouse in the state.

The movement started when the Gogebic County Historical Society presented the state flag to the County Board of Supervisors requesting them to display it at the courthouse during Michigan Week. It would be flown immediately before the American flag.

The Supervisors liked the idea so well that they passed a resolution, one that they are sending to the other 82 counties in the state. They are asking their fellow Supervisors to exhibit a Michigan flag, not only during Michigan Week, but permanently as a reminder of the fact that "It's Great to Live in Michigan."

A history of the flag was sent along with the resolution. To aid in the promotion, newspaper mats of the flag will be distributed to newspapers throughout the state.

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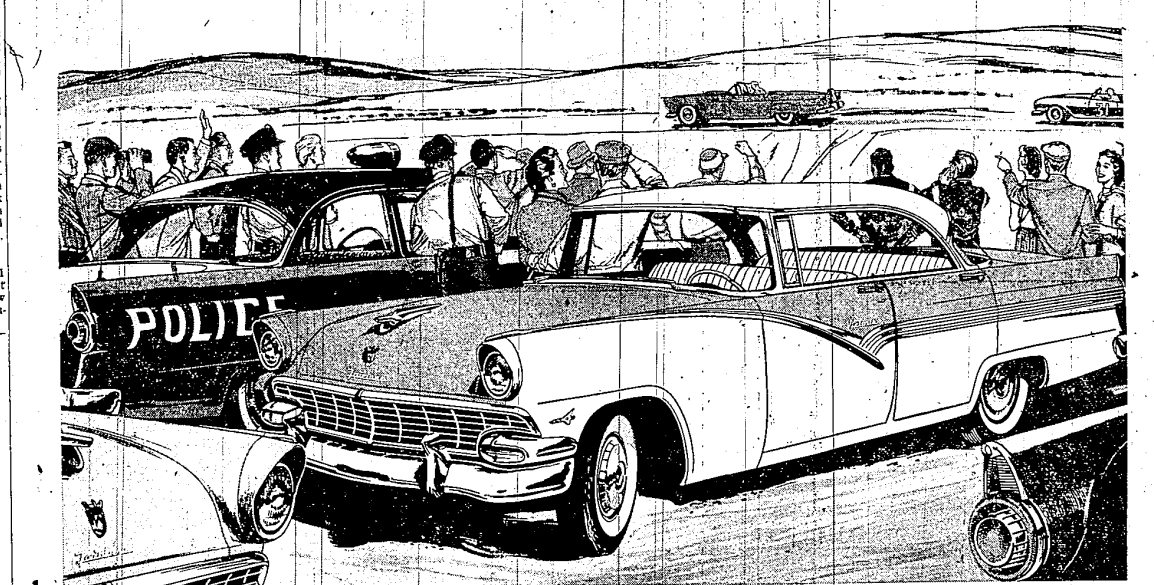
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
