Garden Club Urges
Preservation Of
All Wild Flowers

A plea was made this week by the Farmington Garden Club urging all residents to refrain from picking or moving wild flowers from their natural habitat. Many of these wild flowers are protected by state law, it was pointed out and fines can be imposed upon anyone apprehended picking or destroying them. Among the protected flowers are: all native trilliums, orchids, club mosses, American and Pipsissewa, North American Mayflower, bitter-sweet and Michigan Holly.

Other wild flowers, although not protected by state laws, also should be left undisturbed: the Garden Club intimated. Among them are Spring Beauties, Adonis's tongue-dog's tooth violets, spotted lilies, Jack-in-the-pulpits, wild Columbine, wild iris, Cardinal flowers, Indian Pipes, Pitcher Plants, and wild lilies except herecalsis. Parents are also urged to instruct their children to leave all wild flowers alone.

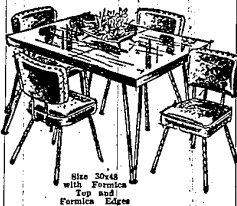
