Beginning with the time he enters training school, a new trooper, receives \$151 every two weeks, the same as was paid with the pay increase effective in February, gets \$178 beginning with his second year. Pay from the third year ranges from \$188 every two weeks up to \$222 in the throoper year. He gets paid vacations, paid sick leave, extra vacation days beginning with the sixth year of service and longevity pay on the completion of the sixth year.
