

Region IV Of Municipal League  
Discusses Water, Other Problems

How to solve the area water supply problem was the major topic of discussion May 2, when 130 municipal officials met in Birmingham.

In attendance were mayors, presidents and other elected and appointed officials from cities and villages in Oakland, Macomb, and Genesee Counties.

They assembled for the annual meeting of Region IV of the Michigan Municipal League.

Following discussions on water problems, a panel outlined the numerous services available to municipalities from state agencies and Michigan Highway Department officials answered questions about city and village street programs.

New Region IV officers were elected following the dinner meeting.

Officers for 1956-57 are: Pontiac Mayor William W. Donaldson, chairman; Clio Mayor Howard

Palmer, vice-chairman; and Roseville City Manager Olaf R. Pearson, secretary.

Through the coming year these officers will serve as liaison between the League and its member municipalities, and play a large role in helping member officials realize and make use of their League membership benefits.

They also arrange the regional meetings, of which ten are held throughout the state each year. Such meetings provide officials an opportunity to discuss common problems and exchange helpful information.

The League is made up of nearly 400 Michigan cities and villages dedicated to improving municipal government.

Ross Campbell of the Thompson-Brown Company addressed the second meeting of the association and answered questions from the members. Drainage, water supply and sewage were important topics discussed. The matter of grading of individual lots was discussed at length.

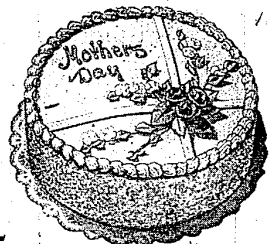
