## Kent Lake Canoe Race Set For June 3

America's biggest canoe race, the eight mile "paddle push" race, the Huron River, is scheduled to start at 2 p.m. Sunday, June 3, at the Milford bridge and conclude in Kensington Metropolitan Park.

Sponsored by Detroit American Youth Hostels, the Milford Board of Commerce and the Huron - Clinton Metropolitan Authority, the race leads the nation's field as far as participants are concerned. It will be run, rain or shine, by some 200 canoeists competing in teams of two for nine trophies in classifications rated according to age and sex.

Last year, 136 took part in the race in spite of a driving rain, and there were nearly 1,000 spectators.

An hour-long water show will precede the 2 p.m. start of the race. Spectators may determine vantage points for viewing the race along the river and enjoy Kent Lake in Kensington Metropolitan Park through a map on American Youth Hostels, 4864 Woodward Avenue, T.E. 1-8000 or a Kensington Park map, also free from the Huron - Clinton Metropolitan Authority, 1750 Guardian Building, W.O. 1-5865.

### ECONOMIC SURVEY OF HUNTING, FISHING PLANNED NEXT FALL

Results of a survey on the economic aspects of hunting and sport fishing are scheduled to be announced early this fall.

Field work for the survey has been completed and some 9,000 questionnaires are now being analyzed, according to the Federal Fish and Wildlife Service which is directing the project.

The survey is designed to find out how much hunters and fishermen spend and what part these expenditures play in the national economy. Sportsmen in various areas were asked to complete the questionnaires.

A detailed report on the survey is scheduled for presentation at the September meeting of the International Association of Game, Fish and Conservation Commissioners. Printed copies of the report will be available at that time.
