Four C.H.S. Girls Picked To Attend Girls' State At U-M

Four Clarenceville High School girls have been selected to attend Girls' State at the University of Michigan this year. Girls attending will be Marie Wyss, Catherine Barnes, Kay Mann, and Sandra Muirhead. They will leave for Ann Arbor June 19 and will return June 29.

The girls were chosen by the school staff at Clarenceville on the merits of their scholarship, cooperativeness, courage, sportsmanship, honesty, physical fitness, and character.

In the course of the week, Girls' State representatives will be given practical experience in local, municipal, county, and state government. Various officials will be chosen with formal inauguration ceremonies following. There will also be recreational activities tuned to several group interests.

Girls' State sponsoring groups in this area are the Livonia Business and Professional Women's Club, Clarenceville Student Council, Clarenceville High School P. T. A., and Farmington Township.

In the fall, reports will be given to the sponsoring organizations and to a student assembly by the Girls' State representatives.

Conduct Library Inspection At CHS

Last Thursday, May 10, a library inspector from the University of Michigan spent the day in the Clarenceville High School library examining the materials at hand and the procedures used in the library. This is the follow-up procedure used in connection with grants and to a student assembly by the Girls' State representatives.

The University of Michigan is extremely helpful in the building of library resources. Librarian Mrs. Hames stated:

Since the library is used primarily by the students for the furthering of class room assignments, it is important that such a place be equipped as completely and as adequately as possible, she added.

Re-cataloging of books, pamphlets and other miscellaneous material is in a process of being completed, plus the cataloging of new books and materials as they come into the library. The extension of reference material as quickly as possible is pre-eminent because of increasing amount of class work requiring a diversified library research, Mrs. Hames concluded.

The couples present whirled to the music of the Fred Netting orchestra.

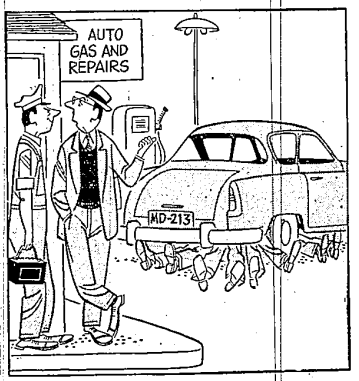

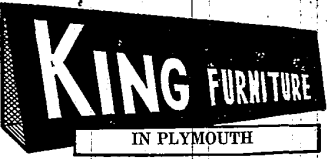
