Falcons Place Fourth In Regional Track Meet At Howell Saturday

The Farmington thinclads took fourth place at the 1956 Regional Track Meet held Saturday, May 13, at Howell. The team, composed of 15 Class "B" teams, Milford took first place with 44 5/14, followed by Howell with 35 3/14, and Grand Lodge with 27 1/4. Farmington had a total of 27 6/7 points.

After a slow start the Falcons began to pick up points late in the meet to come out as the fourth best team. They were blanked in the 100, 200 and 400 yard dashes.

Soap Box Derby Entrants Register At Root Agency

Applications are now being accepted at Bill Root Chevrolet, 32715 Grand River in Farmington, from all boys of this area who wish to enter the annual Soap Box Derby to be held in Detroit this summer.
