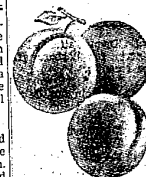

A graduation tea was held recently by Mary Barden for her classmates. Forty guests were present at the tea at the Barden home on Moore Drive.

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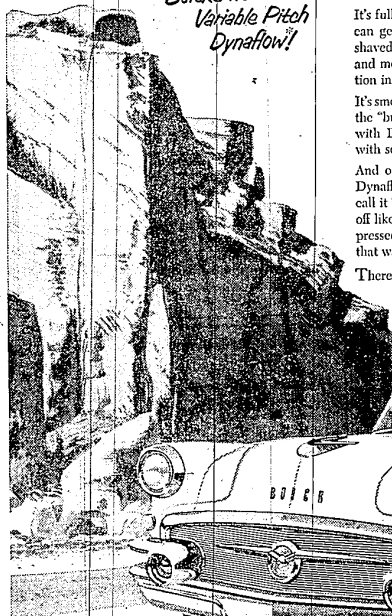
